


Silk Road



Beginning in the first millennium B.C.E., the Silk Road allowed travelers from Eurasia, Asia, and the Middle East to trade goods with one another. Silk and Jewels were traded out of Asia; musical instruments such as cymbals were traded from India to China and Europe; early Persian reed instruments were brought to Europe, which led to the Clarinet and the Oboe. Goods were not the only thing traded along the Silk Road. Scientific ideas and technologies were brought over to Europe from Asia, such as the magnetic compass, the printing press, and mathematics.





1997 Kyoto Protocol

At this conference, the Kyoto Protocol was adopted after intense negotiations. For the first time, the protocol introduced binding targets for greenhouse gas emissions in 37 industrialized countries from 2008 to 2012.



2009 Copenhagen Accord


The United Nations Climate Change Conference was held in Copenhagen, Denmark. The conference included the 15th Conference of the Parties (COP 15) to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change and the 5th Meeting of the Parties since the Kyoto Protocol. The beginnings for the world climate change plan beyond 2012 was agreed there. This document recognized that climate change is one of the greatest challenges of the present and that actions should be taken to keep the average world temperature increases to below 2°C.






Tourism

Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade



Tens of millions of Africans were forcibly deported to the Americas and other parts of the world to work as slaves, mostly in agricultural industries. Ships on the trans-Atlantic trade moved slaves from Africa to the Americas, goods such as sugar and tobacco from the Americas to Europe, and commodities for purchasing slaves from Europe to Africa.

Unemployment rates skyrocketed during the Great Depression




Soup lines and bread lines were common and necessary for hungry Americans

European Union Member Nations




In recent years, the European Union has grown into the most economically unified of the regional organizations, establishing its own central bank and its own currency, the Euro, which went into circulation in 2002.

No benefits, lower wages, and longer hours for workers in developing nations




Loss of jobs in developed nations, resulting in poverty and harm on the local economy










Process of Containerization
