



#### **MAURICE SENDAK**

Maurice Sendak was born in New York City on June 10, 1928. His parents had moved to the United States from Poland.



hen he was very young, Maurice developed a wild imagination.

He began to draw pictures from his imagination. Then, when he was a teenager, he fell in love with a movie which helped him decide to become an illustrator.

In 1947, his illustrations were first published in a science textbook. In 1951, he began his career as an illustrator for many children's books. His first major work was found in **A Hole Is to Dig** (1952), written by Ruth Kraus. He did many more projects with Kraus. Then he started writing and illustrating stories of his own.

#### Did You Know..?

- Maurice Sendak was inspired by Walt Disney's Fantasia
- Where the Wild Things Are won the Caldecott Award in 1964.
- The "wild things" are based on his aunts and uncles who loved him so much!

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



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


### **Activity Two**


