






Sometimes, they suggest it through a series of small bits of **information** or details that add up to one main idea. They leave it to you to draw the right conclusion based on the hints you get from the story. A **conclusion** is a sensible decision you reach based on details or facts in a story or article.

There are four questions you can ask yourself that will help you draw conclusions as you read:


