


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

What is the difference between the theme and the subject of a story?



All narrative stories, plays, or movies have a literary device called, theme. The **theme** of any story is the main idea or point that the author is trying to tell the audience. The theme is also what the author wants you to remember most about the story.

Sometimes, the theme of a story is the answer to the question, "What did you learn from reading this?"

It is important to remember that the theme of a story is not the same thing as the subject of a story. The theme refers to the entire message that the writer is trying to send with his or her story through the use of characterization, action, and
