#### The Global Environment

eople and all other living things require resources, such as air, water, and food, from nature in order to survive. Living things must find these esources in their environment, or surroundings. Industrialization and population growth place demands on resources, and also cause pollution. These environmental problems have spread around the world with globalization. But the awareness of these problems and the science and technology needed to solve them has also spread, especially over the last few decades. People have become more aware that the world's people and all other living things share certain environmental commons, such as the oceans and the atmosphere.



What are resources?

#### **International Treaties**

As people have become aware of the nature of environmental problems, leaders fr different nations and organizations have together to formulate international treaties, or agreements, that protect the environment. Two such world treaties that aim to reduce greenhouse gas emissions are the **Kyoto Protocol of 1997** and the UN Climate Change Conference in Copenhagen of 2009. These gases are mainly produced by burning fossil fuels. They trap heat in the atmosphere, which has resulted in an increase in average global temperatures, or global warming. Global warming



can cause problems around the world, such as a rise in sea level, stronger storms, drought, changes in agricultural productivity, and the spread of tropical diseases.

The United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea, adopted in 1982, is a comprehensive treaty governing the world's oceans. It acknowledges that the open oceans beyond nations' coastlines belong to all people, and that we all must work together to protect the oceans by regulating fishing, mining, oil exploration, shipping, and other activities that remove resources or add pollution.

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Hands-On Activity # 3

## Be a Conscious World Travel Agent

Plan international vacations for people that maximize the positive impacts and minimize the negative impacts of tourist activity on indigenous and local populations.

First, use the library and internet resources to research destinations that would be fun for tourists and beneficial for local peoples, cultures, and economies. Find out about:

- How different tourist activities impact local and indigenous people and local economies. Popular activities include visiting beaches, wildlife areas, and historical sites;
- How tourists can move from place to place with the least pollution or disruption to locals;
- What resources tourists will need, and where they can get these resources without affecting local people's ability to use the resources;
- How tourists' waste can be managed without polluting the local environment;
- How local and indigenous people can be supported by tourist activities, for example, by selling crafts or tickets to performances.

Then, plan a tour package. Include

- Several destinations;

- How tourists will traver to different destinations on the tour;
  Where tourists will eat and sleep;
  What sites tourists will see and what activities they will participate in.

Finally, design a brochure to advertise your conscious travel tours. Your brochure should:


- Provide all necessary information about the tour package, including destinations, activities, and accommodations;

- Explain why your tours are more globally conscious, helping rather than harming local and indigenous people, their environment, and their onomy.


