Someone's personal identity is made up of many different parts. Everyone's personal identity is different just like our tingerprints. Some examples are:

- Identifying as a girl or a boy.
- Identifying as gay, straight or bisexual.
- Identifying as cisgender or transgender.

However, there is much more to a person's identity than just those things. Personal identities can change as a person gets older. Some parts stay the same throughout a person's life. Other parts change!

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


What is Transgender?

Babies start to notice the difference between boys and girls at the age of 1. By the age of 5, they start to have an idea of what their gender identity is. They might start to understand whether their gender identity matches their assigned sex. This becomes more and more clear to a child as they grow up.

A person whose assigned sex is different from their gender identity is known as **transgender**. As a person grows up, they will learn more about themselves. A person assigned female at birth may grow up to identify as a boy. The same is true for a person assigned male at birth who feels more like a girl.




Here is an example of two spectrums for a transgender woman. One represents their assigned sex. The other represents their gender identity.



The transgender woman was born a male but identifies as a woman. This is why the Xs are at opposite ends.
