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# Gender Roles in Different Time Periods and in Different Cultures

Throughout history, there have been some roles that have been thought of as a "man's job". Others are thought of as a "woman's job". These are known as **gender roles**. Cooking and cleaning were considered a woman's job. Physical work, like fixing things, was considered a man's job. Gender roles are based on **traditions** and **stereotypes**. Men are traditionally seen as the money makers of the family. Women are thought of as the child caregivers. This is because of how things were when early humans lived. Men were the hunters and the women were the gatherers. This became seen as **the norm**.

## Key Term: The 'norm' is something that is expected in a certain culture or time period.

Gender norms have changed. Some major changes happened because of the war. Most women did not have jobs before World War 1. Many men left to fight when the war started. This meant that many jobs were left open. Women stepped in and took many of the jobs that the men had worked. Some made weapons and war materials. Others filled roles like bus drivers or railway guards. When the men returned from war, many women did not want to give up their jobs. This forced a change in gender roles.

Gender roles can be harmful. They can lead to **assumptions** about what men and women should be like. At one time, the thought of women working outside of the home was shocking. Now many women are doctors, lawyers and leaders. A lot has changed! However, sometimes women are still treated like they are less able than men.
