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



Intersectionality: Fighting for Rights, Understanding & Respect on Multiple Fronts

People face discrimination for lots of reasons. It could be because of gender. Or sexual orientation. It could also be because of race or age. It could be because of education or disability. Some people have more **privilege** than others. It's important to understand how this can affect your life.

Key Term: Privilege is when a certain group has advantages that they didn't earn. These are given for free because of how they were born. It could also have to do with the life they were born into. Male and white privilege are examples.

Some people can face **inequality** for more than one reason. A woman might deal with **sexism** because of her gender. A Black person may face **racism** because of the color of their skin. A Black woman might deal with both of those things. It's important to think about how a person's life is affected by their identities. **Intersectionality** points out that some people face inequality for more than one reason. Think of it as a crossroads. This is where our different identities connect to make us who we are!

Key Term: When someone is discriminated against because of their gender.

This is called sexism. Some people are discriminated against because of their race.

This is called racism.




