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
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Purposeful Writing

What's Creative?

The root word for creative is create. Look in your dictionary for the definition of the word. You choose the words. The sentences are constructed by you. The flow of language comes from your style of expression.

choreographed a dance for a program built and painted scenery for a play made a clothespin animal to hold notes designed an advertisement put together a model plane wrote a story baked a pizza thought up a slogan designed a geometric pattern said something funny dreamed up a great simile and/or metaphor made a sock puppet made peanut brittle trained your dog to do a trick

The reason for all of this is to remind you just how creative you are (or can be) almost every day, without realizing that so much of what you produce is inventive!
