



John F. Kennedy's Inaugural Address & Paraphrase

- I) Vice President Johnson, Mr. Speaker, Mr. Chief Justice, President Eisenhower, Vice President Nixon, President Truman, Reverend Clergy, Fellow Citizens:
- 2) We observe today not a victory of party but a celebration of freedom-symbolizing an end as well as a beginning-signifying renewal as well as change. For I have sworn before you and Almighty God the same solemn oath our forebearers prescribed nearly a century and three-quarters ago.
- 3) The world is very different now. For man holds in his mortal hands the power to abolish all forms of human poverty and all forms of human life. And yet the same revolutionary beliefs for which our forebearers fought are still at issue around the globe—belief that the rights of man come not from the generosity of the state but from the hand of God.

- I) Vice President Johnson, Mr. Speaker of the House, Mr. Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, Vice President Nixon, Reverend Clergy, Fellow Citizens:
- 2) What we see today is a celebration of freedom, not a victory of one political party over another. It is a symbol of renewal and change. I have sworn to you and God the same pledge our ancestors wrote in the Constitution nearly 175 years ago.
- 3) The world is different than it was 175 years ago. We have the ability to end both human poverty and all human life. Yet the same ideals of the American Revolution are still alive around the world. That idea is that God gives human rights to us, not any government.
