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# **Setting the Scene**

### Discussion

Ask the children to look around and name the things they see in their world. Tell them not to look at man-made items (e.g., toys, houses, cars, streets) but rather to look at natural phenomena (e.g., water, sun, plants, animals, rocks). Ask them what the world would be like if there were no people in the environment. Show them pictures (without people or animals) of giant sequoias, fern grottoes, volcanoes, rivers, rain forests, marshes, etc., emphasizing that the world was warmer and wetter in the age of dinosaurs. Use the key words to guide the discussion back over time.

# **Key Words**

• environment: The world around us.

- prehistoric: A long time ago starting before people were in the world.
- •volcano: A special kind of mountain.
- •eruption: A volcanic explosion of lava and ash.
- •lava: Hot, melted rock.
- •volcanic rock: Cold, hard lava.
- pumice stone: Cold lava that has bubbles trapped inside. This stone is so light, it may float in water.
- extinct volcano: A volcano that will never erupt again.

# Suggested Activities & Experiments for Children


- 1. Place rocks in water to determine if any will float.
