

#### Setting the Stage

- Write on the board, "Only two more days of school! . . . . April Fools!"
- Before school, write everyone's name backwards (Fred is Derf) and try to call them (and yourself) by backwards names for the rest of the day. You may prefer to let students make up names for themselves today. Let students sign their papers all day with their backwards or made-up names.







 Throughout the day, do silly and unexpected things (wear sunglasses in the classroom, wear your clothes backwards, wear your socks over your shoes, etc.). Your students will never forget it!



 Display student work with a picture of a court jester and the caption: "No FOOLING, this is great work!"

 Construct a semantic web with words your students think of when you say, "April Fools' Day."





## Historical Background

The first day of April is traditionally April Fools' Day. The celebration originated in France. On their new year's celebration, the first day of spring, the French exchange gifts and treats. When the calendar was changed in the 16th century, these practices were stopped except for those far out in the country who hadn't heard about the change. When some people continued to give gifts though the official celebration had ended, they were made fun of, called "fools" and became the object of practical jokes. As time went on and everyone finally heard about the change, people continued with the practical jokes just for fun!


• Let students suggest words that have the "oo" sound as in fools.
