Teacher Input

You may wish to familiarize students with the time period of the book in some of the ways suggested below. If time is a problem, have a group of your best workers do the suggested research and present it to the class.

- 1. Draw a time line of the 20th century on computer paper or shelf paper. Spend a research period finding out important dates, inventions, medical discoveries, etc.
- 2. Research the year 1925. Find out about cards, planes, clothing, hairstyles, dances, movies, music, gangsters, etc. Who was Prime Minister, what was the population of Toronto, and what was in the news that year? Write information in brief newspaper-style articles. Print headings and draw pictures and put the information on a bulletin board for reference throughout the novel.
- 3. Have students interview friends or relatives who can tell them about the 1920s and share their findings with the class...

or

Invite seniors from a local nursing home to do a short presentation and answer students' questions.

Keep an ongoing chart as you read the novel to show how things were different in 1925. At the end of the novel, do a chart to show what things have remained the same.

A letter from home leaves her with mixed emotions—she misses her family but enjoys her privileges on the farm.

Chapter 2 — The Secret Signal




Chapter 3 — My Dilemma


