
SENTENCES PARTS OF SPEECH SUBJECTS AND PREDICATES PRONOUNS

The definitions and examples here and on the next two pages will help you remember the parts of speech and how they are used in sentences. As you work through this book, refer to these pages if you need a reminder.



A pronoun replaces a noun.

Sam told James about his latest space video.

He told him about it.

The noun that a pronoun replaces is called the pronoun's antecedent.

A pronoun must agree with its antecedent:

If the noun is singular, the pronoun must be singular.

If the noun names a male, use the pronoun he or him.


If the noun names a female, use the pronoun she or her.

If the noun names a thing, use the pronoun it.

If the noun is plural, use the pronouns we, us, they, them, and you.

Use the pronouns I, me, and you as personal pronouns.

The simple subject of a sentence is always a noun or pronoun.



These pronouns can be subjects: *I, you, he, she, it, we, they.* They are called *subjective pronouns*.

PRONOUNS ADJECTIVES AND ADVERBS PREPOSITIONS COMPLEX SENTENCES

A *noun clause* is a dependent clause that is used the same way as a noun. It can be a subject, a direct object, a predicate nominative, or an object of a preposition.

noun clause

Whatever you are cooking smells delicious. subject

Did you enjoy what you had for dinner? direct object

My question is whether you have room for dessert. predicate nominative

This pie is for whoever wants it. object of preposition

These are words that introduce noun clauses.
