Another Ideal Make into a workbook of free pieces as in **Some Things Are Better Off Locked Up!**

*** Occupations**
Student Objective: to sort the pictures of the "tools of trade" to the correct occupation.
 -colour and cut out the illustrative pictures. Glue onto bristol and cut out again leaving a 1 cm border. If you would like to label the characters, leave a larger border of bristol for the printing.
 -colour and cut out the sorting pictures. Glue onto bristol and cut out leaving a 1 cm border.
 -store in a zip close bag. Label for easy identification.
HOW TO USE: Lay out the characters on the table or floor. Place the pictures for sorting beside the correct character.

*** Mrs. Munchkin's House**
Student Objective: to classify Mrs. Munchkin's furniture according to the room they belong in.

bedroom	bathroom
kitchen	living room

Instructions
*** Classification "File" Workbooks**
 The following workbooks are designed to fit into a file folder, letter size.
 -Kirby's Workshop, Sue's Sewing Room
 -Pack My Suitcase
 -Hard Things, Soft Things
 -Real or Storybook?
 -Fruit or Vegetable?
 -Good Tooth, Bad Tooth
 -Land Water or Air
 -Summer, Winter
 -Farm Animals, Zoo Animals
 -Touch, Don't Touch
Student Objective: to classify the given pictures to the correct illustrated category.
Example: Real or Storybook?
 -colour, cut out and glue the illustrative pictures onto either side of an opened letter size file. (Yellow is a colour of file I recommend.)

ILLUSTRATION:

-colour, cut out and glue the smaller sorting pictures onto 2 ply bristol. Cut out the pictures but leave a 1 cm border of bristol.
 -Some of the illustrative pictures are not labelled. You may do this on the file with a coloured felt marker.
Another ideal If you would prefer a workbook consisting of all free pieces, cut out and mount the illustrative pictures as you would the sorting pictures. Store the pieces in zip close bags. Label for easy identification.
*** Animals Need a Home**
Student Objective: to find homes for the animals.
 -colour, cut and glue the illustrative pictures of the animals' homes onto a 1/2 bristol sheet.
 Arrange attractively.
 -colour and cut out the animal picture disks. Glue onto bristol and cut out again, leaving a 1 cm bristol border.
HOW TO USE: Place the picture disks of the animals beside its home on the format.

1 cm bristol around the picture.

HOW TO USE: Sort the pictures to either side of the file.

*** Some Things Are Better Off Locked Up!**
Student Objective: to sort the items in the house to the cupboard, refrigerator or locked cupboard.
 -use a full size bristol sheet.
 Yellow, red or orange will work well.
 -colour and cut out the illustrative pictures.
 Glue onto the bristol sheet.

Some things are better off LOCKED UP!

HOW TO USE: Use this workbook on the floor or hang it up. If you decide to hang up the format, insert paper clips or drapery hooks in appropriate places to make for easy sorting.

Another ideal For a workbook of free pieces, cut out and mount the illustrative pictures as you would the sorting pictures. Store the pieces in zip close bags. Label for easy identification.
*** I Have Five Senses!**
Student Objective: to sort the pictures of things associated to each sense.
 -use a full size bristol sheet. A bright colour such as red or yellow works the best.
Why not add star stickers to brighten up the format?

HOW TO USE: Place format on the floor or table and sort out the pictures to the sense associated with them.
