PHONICS PRACTICE

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Introduction

The purpose of phonics is to help students read new words by sounding them out. The student who uses phonics to decode a word can associate the printed letters with the speech sounds the letters represent and then blend them together to pronounce the word.

There are many vowel sounds that do not follow the rules governing short and long vowels. The purpose of this book, *Vowel Combinations*, is to teach these irregular vowel sounds. Included are the vowel diphthongs, the *r*-controlled vowels, and other irregular vowel combinations.

A *diphthong* is a combination of two vowels, each contributing to the unique sound heard. The vowels in the diphthong *oi*, for instance, do not make the sound of *o* or of *i*, but together form the vowel sound heard in the word *boil*. The diphthongs covered in this book are *oi*, *oy*, *ow*, *ou*, and *ew*.

When a vowel is followed immediately by the letter r, its sound is changed. In the word bird, for example, the letter i has neither the short i nor the long i sound. There are lessons on ar, er, ir, or, and ur in this book.

The term *irregular vowels* describes letters or letter combinations, other than diphthongs and *r*-controlled vowels, that do not follow the generalizations of short and long vowels. Irregular vowels included in this book are *oo*, *au*, *aw*, *ea*, *ie*, *ei*, *a* (followed by *I*), and *o* (as in the word *soft*).

Lessons vary in length, depending on difficulty and frequency of occurrence. The lessons include practice in recognizing the vowel sound by using picture clues, rhyming words, and word meanings, and by writing vowels in words and sentences.

The review pages, which occur throughout the book, provide practice in discriminating the sounds of several vowels or vowel combinations.

Vowel Combinations, as well as the other books in this series, is meant for use at home or in school. At home, the books may be used as a supplement to schoolwork. In school, the books may be used as a phonics text in the primary grades or as a supplementary aid for students who need extra help in phonics. Teachers at the junior high or high school levels may also find these books useful for remediation.

When the vowels oy blend together, they make the sound you hear in the word toy.
