Introduction

Studying phonics helps students read new words by sounding them out. Students use phonics to decode a word by associating the printed letters with the speech sounds the letters represent. The sounds are then blended to pronounce the word.

Consonant blends consist of two or three letters whose sounds are blended but not changed when pronounced in a word. In the word break, for example, the letters b and r are both pronounced distinctly and yet are heard as one unit of sound. In this book, two-letter blends are presented first because they are easier to learn and appear more frequently in textbooks. Three-letter blends are introduced later.

The activities provide practice in

- recognizing the blend sound in a word using picture clues;
- using a blend to complete words;
- choosing words with blends to complete sentences; and
- choosing words to match meanings.

A *digraph* is a combination of two letters that represents a single speech sound. That is, the two letters that form a digraph no longer retain their individual sounds, but form a new sound when pronounced in a word. For example, when the consonants *s* and *h* appear in a word as a digraph, they make the sound as in the word *shirt*. In this book, the lessons on digraphs are taught in the same manner as the blends.

The review pages, which occur throughout the book, provide practice in discriminating blends or digraphs. This book, *Blends & Digraphs*, as well as the other books in this series, can be used at home or in school. At home, the books may be used to enrich or supplement schoolwork. In school, the teacher may use them as a phonics text in the primary grades or as a supplementary aid for students who need extra help in phonics. Students ready for more challenge may be able to use these books independently. Teachers at the junior high or high school levels who have poor readers will also find these books to be an effective tool for remediation in phonics.






