The Inuit of the North

The Inuit live in the far north. This <u>region</u> is called the Arctic. The Arctic stretches for about 64,000 kilometers from the Pacific Ocean on the west to the Atlantic Ocean on the east. On a map, it is the northern part of Canada, which includes Nunavut, (Canada's newest territory) the Northwest Territories, and the Yukon. The Inuit also live in northern Alaska, which is part of the United States. The United States is Canada's southern neighbour.

The Inuit believe that they came to Canada from western Asia. It is thought that they crossed the Bering Strait in boats during the summer and over the ice during the winter. It is also believed that the Inuit originated from Siberia in Asid.

ome Inuit features re, an oval, wide-shaped, ned, colored face with high cheekbones. Their hair is straight and black.

In the Arctic the winters are long, dark and very cold. There is an amazing sight in the northern Arctic sky. It is called the Northern Lights or the "Aurora Borealis". These lights seem to dance and swirl across the sky. They constantly change their shape as they dance, and appear to have a coloured glow about them.

Inuit The call themselves Yupiks, which means "the real people". The Inuit were <u>nomads</u> as they never stayed in one place for very long. Their existence depended on the herds of caribou, seals, whales, and other birds and animals in their environment. animals, in turn provided them with food, shelter, clothing, weapons, and tools.

The Inuit are simple, friendly, happy people who accept what life brings them. In the past, the Inuit had no




