OVERVIEW

Best On The Box is a theme-based, complete Christmas concert. It has been designed to include every student in the school, while dividing the work load equally among the staff through the component system.

Each staff member should become familiar with the story and the component that they wish their class to perform. Each component is a unit in itself and can be rehearsed as a separate classroom unit, thus greatly reducing the time needed to prepare this production. Each component includes a description of characters, props, costumes, and stage directions. Those staff members who do not have a regular class of students, such as the Librarian or the Teacher Assistants, might wish to be the Director and/or be responsible for rehearsing the main characters or the choir.

The component feature allows teachers to add or delete items to suit their particular school size. To include more classrooms, creative teachers may wish to make up or adapt other acts to fit the theme. Other possibilities might include any popular T.V. shows such as situation comedies, game shows, sports commentaries, interview/talk shows, and Walt Disney (Dashing Through The Snow...White, a comedy adaptation of Snow White And The Seven Dwarfs, found in the Oct./Nov. 1986 edition of Classroom magazine is very good and would be suitable for Grades 4 through 8.). Current T.V. shows are best. You may also choose to do a re-run of an old T.V. show such as Ed Sullivan. Almost any concert item can be inserted by writing a few introductory and concluding lines for Santa Claus plus inserting a song for the choir which provides time for each act to get on and off stage. If your school does not wish to follow the theme, each individual component may be used in a variety concert by excluding Santa Claus' part.

THE STORY

Santa Claus has come down with a cold one week before Christmas. His doctor has advised that if he takes some medicine he could be better in seven days and if he doesn't he will be better in a week. The doctor recommends that Santa should rest up - curl up in his easy chair and watch a little T.V. Santa takes him at his word and watches the BEST ON THE BOX which includes a variety of T.V. shows (The Components), commercials, and school choir fill-ins. Santa's day of watching T.V. Christmas Specials culminates in *Charlie Brown's Christmas* which reveals the true meaning of Christmas - The Nativity Scene.

COMMERCIAL #1 - CANADIAN BUMPER

(Children are looking at toys on display. Scrooge and Santa walk towards them.)

(CURTAIN CLOSES.)

well, I'll just have to keep working on him."

PRODUCTION NOTES

Throughout the concert, Santa performs in front of the curtain or below stage level. He sits in a swivel easy chair which allows him to face the audience and the stage. Each time he clicks his channel changer, the curtains open. The script of Santa, the commercials, and the singing of the choir provides enough time for one class to leave the stage and for the next class to get on stage and get ready. Two aisles and two side stage doors allow for a smooth arrival and departure of classes by having them enter by one aisle and leave by the other. Stage hands for the entire performance are a definite asset in setting and clearing the stage and allowing for a smooth transition from one T.V. show to the next. The stage hands will find it much easier to do their job efficiently if you prepare a list of props for each performance.

A complete rehearsal is recommended to time items so that each class can be ready to enter on time and so Santa, the lighting and sound directors, stage hands, and curtain puller(s) can practice their cues. This also provides an opportunity for students to practice using the microphones.

The choir is best placed below stage level or to the right of the stage so that while they are singing, the stage can be set for the next performance. The theme music for each T.V. show can be taped from the television and used to introduce each performance.

The channel names and numbers that Santa switches to have been left blank. You may wish to insert the initials of your school or the number of the grade that will be performing the item.

We have found that rehearsing for the concert is much more efficient if the whole school practices at the same time. This allows assisting teachers, aides, or parents to pull Santa and the choir from class for their practice. The part of Santa should be played by an older student or you may wish to cast a staff member or a parent volunteer in this part.

Stage decoration is not necessary for the concert, but if you wish to, it should be as neutral as possible considering the variety of settings for the scenes. A T.V. screen with letters of your school and the logo "Tuned In To You" or "Best On The Box" (printed on a flexible material), could be attached to the curtain so that when the curtains are closed, it appears that the T.V. station is still on.

COSTUMES AND PROPS:

This play has seven scenes but all of them can be performed without having to close the curtains. The actors can exit and enter while the narrator is speaking. The characters should be costumed in a similar fashion to the cartoon characters on the Flintstone's T.V. show. Props should include whatever livingroom furniture you wish to use; a table or a desk which can double as the bank manager's desk; a pine tree painted on heavy cardboard and tall enough for a student to stand behind; St. Nickel's sleigh painted on heavy cardboard and attached to a wagon; a phone; a computer sheet; adding machine tape or an office ledger; and a big bat.

This play is an afternoon talk show, in which the host introduces assorted guests and celebrities. The name may be changed to suit a male host or to any other afternoon Talk show.

On stage you will need 7 chairs across center back for the guests and one chair (slightly to the right of these) for the host. The Air Band is positioned to the left and the Producer to the right. You will require some taped theme music representing a talk show. For Billy Rae Cyprus, you will need taped music of the song, "Achy Breaky Heart". "The Walk Of Life" by the Dire Straits would be appropriate for Waldo's entrance on stage. For the Queen's entrance, you will need "God Save The Queen". "Upbeat" music for Vancy and "slow" music for Belle will be needed. New "guests" can be added easily.

Wilma: "That was Mr. Slate's accountant. It appears that Fred was fired. I

Betty: "Men! Barney is always close by when Fred is up to something. I

wonder where they are."

Wilma: "He must feel pretty miserable, Betty. How could Mr. Slate be so

(Exit Betty and Wilma, heads together, planning)

"And so with the aid of Pebbles and Bam Bam

(Enter Pebbles and Bam Bam from left, Wilma and Betty from right)

Pebbles: "Mother! Everyone says that they can come. The response to your

invitations has been great!"

Betty: "Yes, Wilma. Even the Slates agreed to come, although I'd never

have believed they would show their faces!"

Pebbles: "What do you think of all this Bam Bam?"

Bam Bam! Bam! Bam! Bam! Bam!"

Pebbles: (Laughs) "I agree. The party's going to be a knockout! A real blast!"

Bam Bam! Bam! Bam! Bam! Bam!"

STAGE SET:

Narrator:

The stage should be set with a neutral background, with the news desk at stage right in front of the curtain, if there is room. If there isn't room, an inner curtain (some sheets pinned over a wire and pulled by a student on each side) could be behind the news desk. If you don't wish to have an inner curtain, the characters for each scene can enter from the left stage door and the reporter can enter from the right.
