



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Lesson # 2 - The Old Man and the Bear - A Russian Folktale

Suggested Teaching Strategies

When reading or performing, students should always face the audience. To provide variety, one or more students might be seated instead of having them all stand in a line. Simple props such as masks can be used to good effect. As well, percussion instruments, sound effects, and mime gestures can add to the overall results of a performance.

Theme: "The Old Man and the Bear" - By using one's creativity to adapt to changing circumstances, adversity can be turned to advantage.

Russian Folktales

Although there are no fairies in Russian folklore - there are tales filled with male and female heroes, with animals that talk and behave like humans, and with soldiers who are on their way home and meet up with both good and bad fortune. The villain in many Russian tales, the large grey wolf, is now found only in the wilds of Siberia and the remoter areas of European Russia. Its reputation of killing sheep and farm animals is only true when it is desperately hungry; attacks on humans are very rare.

Lesson # 1 - Paul Bunyan - An American Tall Tale

Suggested Teaching Strategies

<u>Tall Tales:</u> A tall tale features a larger-than-life or superhuman main character, with a specific task in life. Often, it involves the solving of a problem in a humourous way. Details of the story tend to be exaggerated, describing things as greater than they really are. North American settlers who made their homes in the wilderness popularized the tall tale on this continent. In those days, long before TV and movies, people depended on storytelling for entertainment. After a long day's work, people gathered to tell each other funny tales. Each group of workers, loggers, cowboys, railroad and steel workers had their own tall tale hero

Readers Theatre has been implemented in many classrooms as a fun and exciting way of reinforcing the instruction of reading, imparting information, and even teaching ideas or concepts. There are a multitude of ways that Readers Theatre can be implemented, ranging from Circle Reading, Instant Reading, Co-operative Reading, or Staged Reading. Performance approaches include Chamber Theatre and Story Theatre. Many of these approaches are

- scripts should be read rather than recited
- actors are encouraged to stay in the same spot, instead of moving around the stage → movements, actions, gestures and expressive voices are encouraged
- simple costumes and props can be used. Even an interesting hat can be an effective
