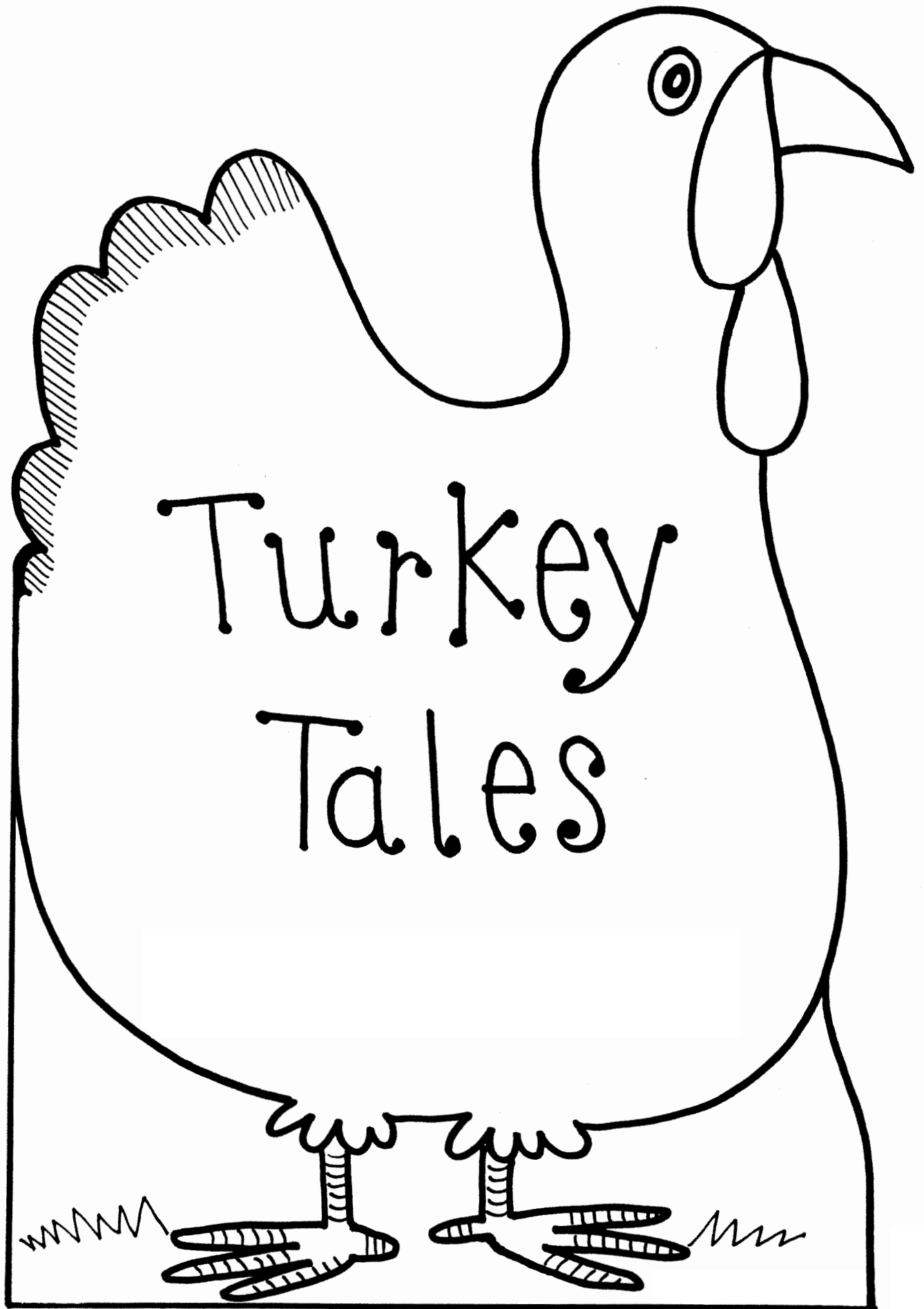

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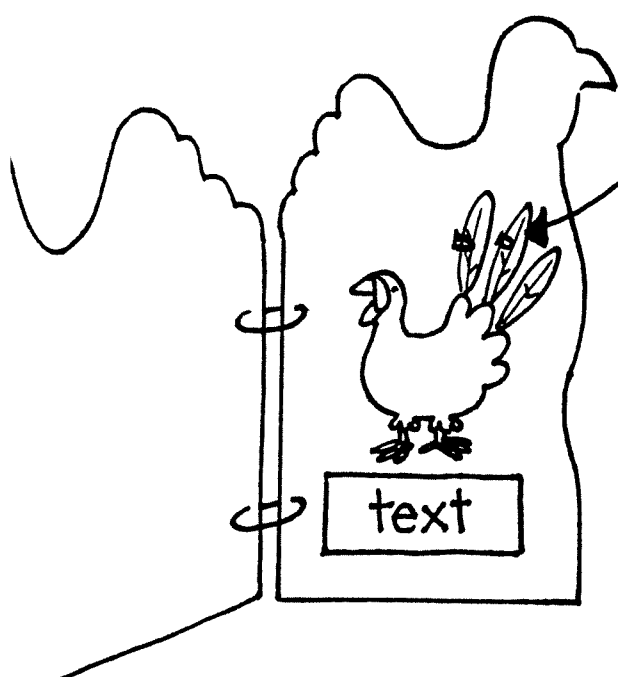


Turkey Tales

You can make a turkey-shape Big Book or a rectangular shaped as in School Today.

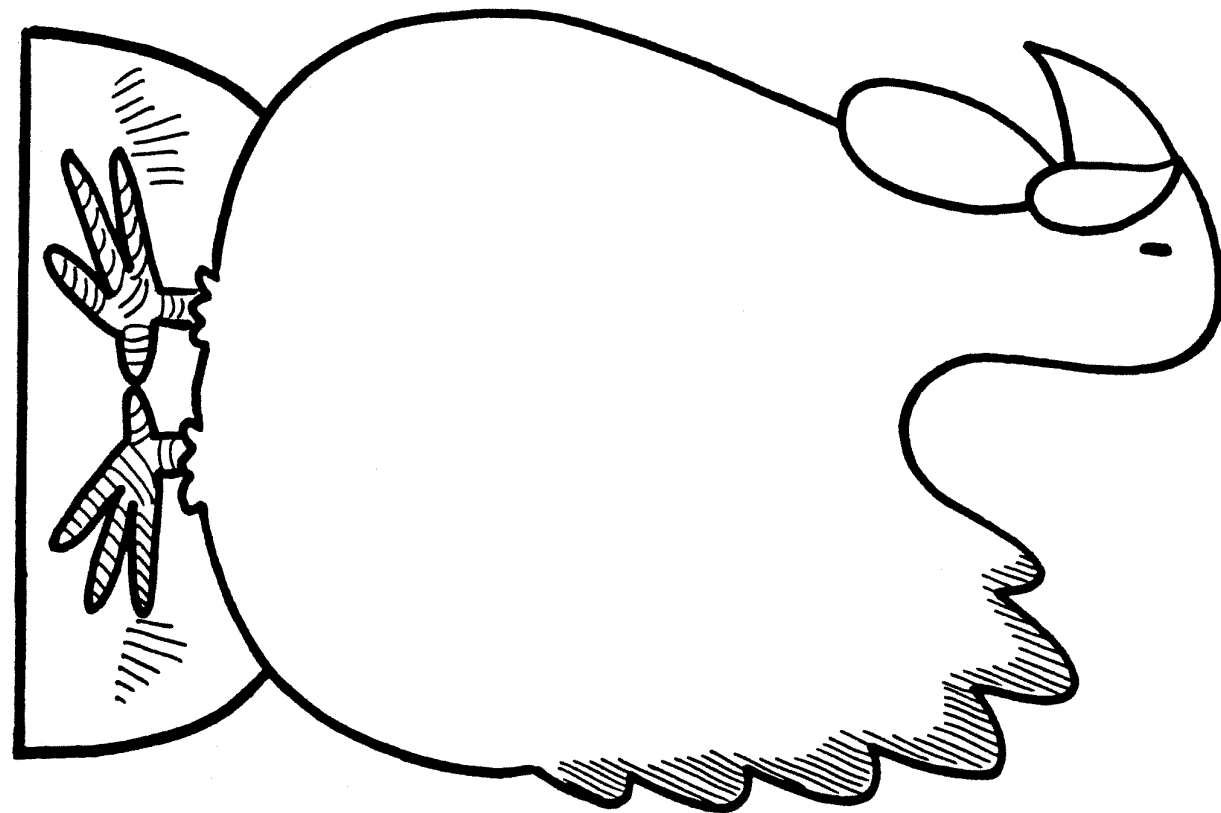
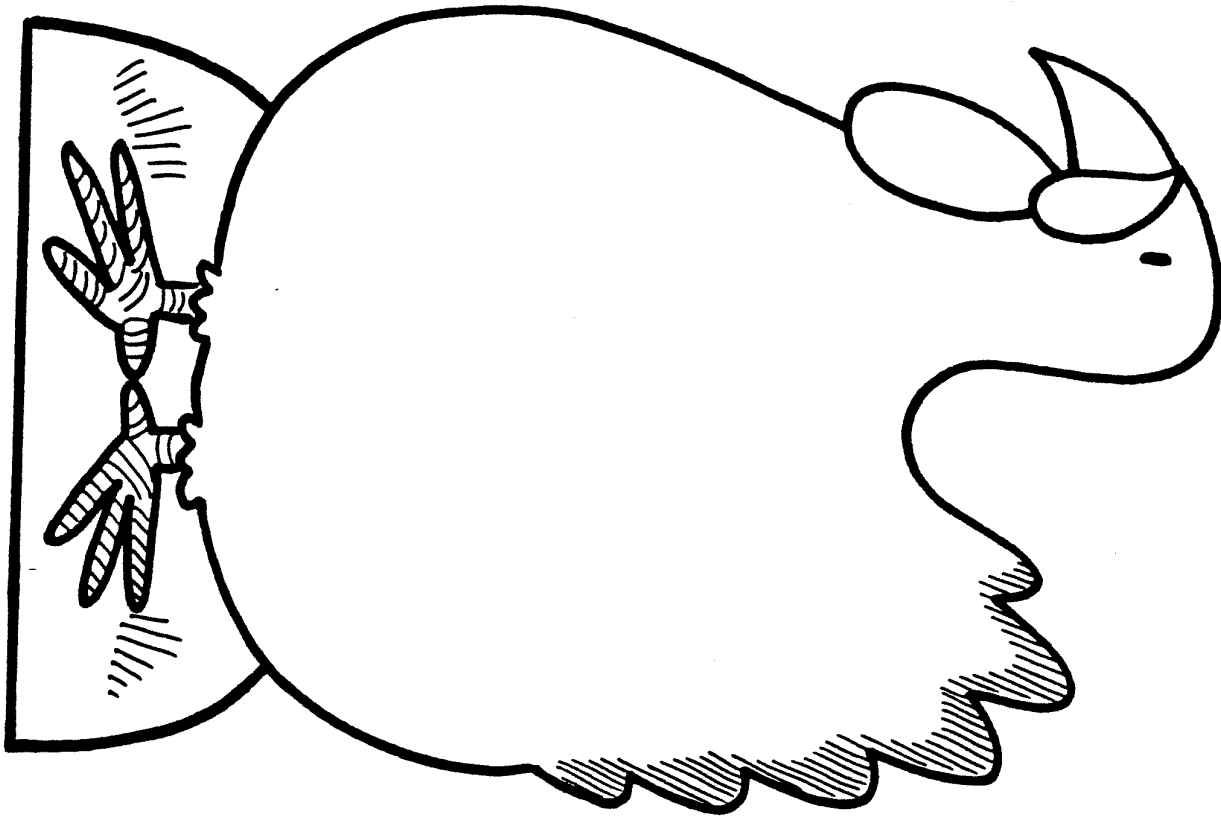
To make the shape book, enlarge the turkey pattern to about the size of $\frac{1}{2}$ bristol sheet.

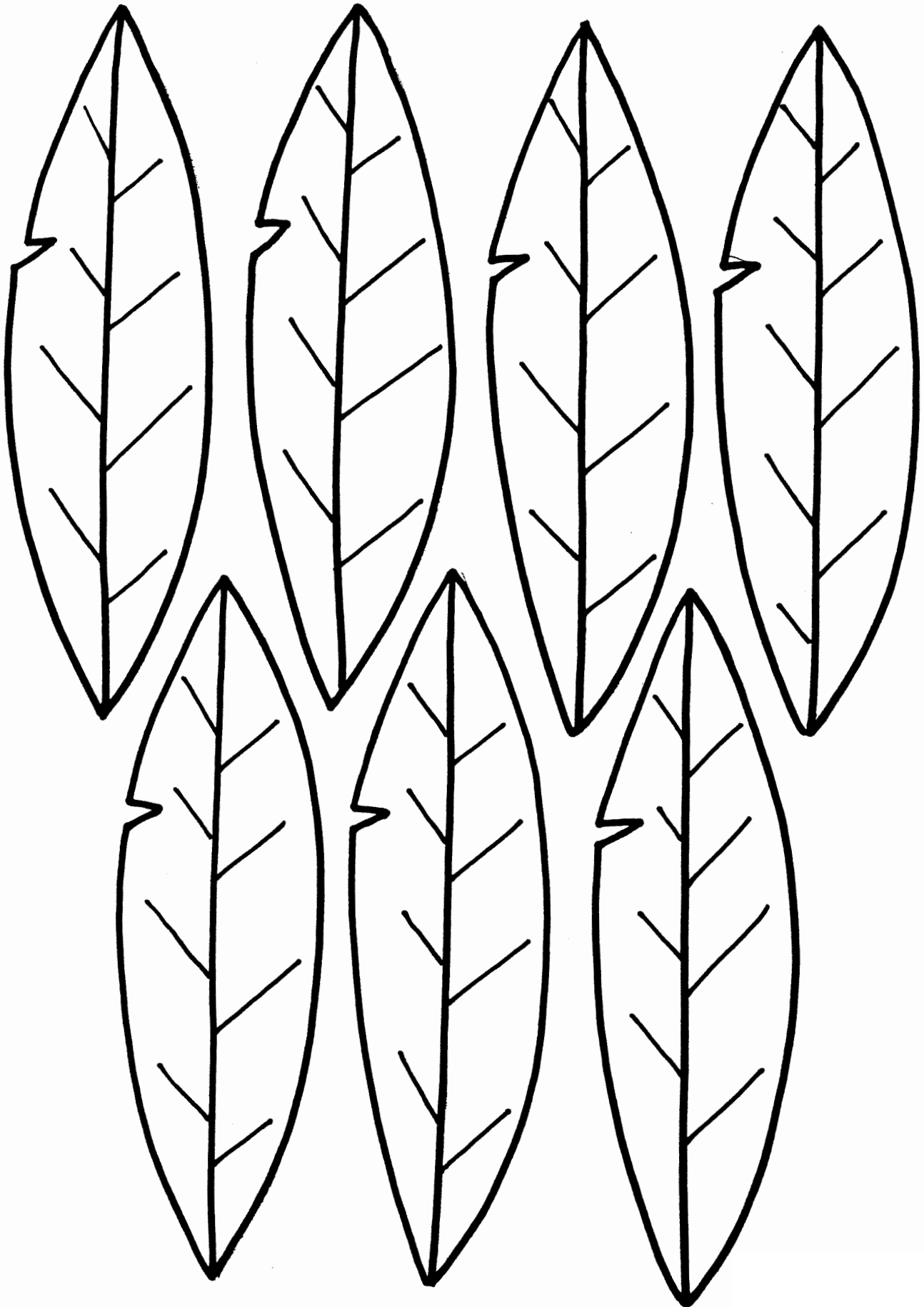
- You'll need 8 pages for the story and one front cover. Use orange 2 ply bristol.
- Photocopy feather page to give you 24 feathers.
- Colour feathers as indicated in text. For the last page of the story you'll need a feather of each colour; brown, purple, pink, blue, black and yellow.
- Cut out the feathers and mount on a bristol backing.
- Photocopy 6 turkeys. Colour, cut out.



cut slits and insert paper clips

As you read the story, ask the audience to find the appropriate feathers. The remaining feathers go on last page. Glue an envelope on the back of the book to store the feathers.

I red , I orange , I yellow.

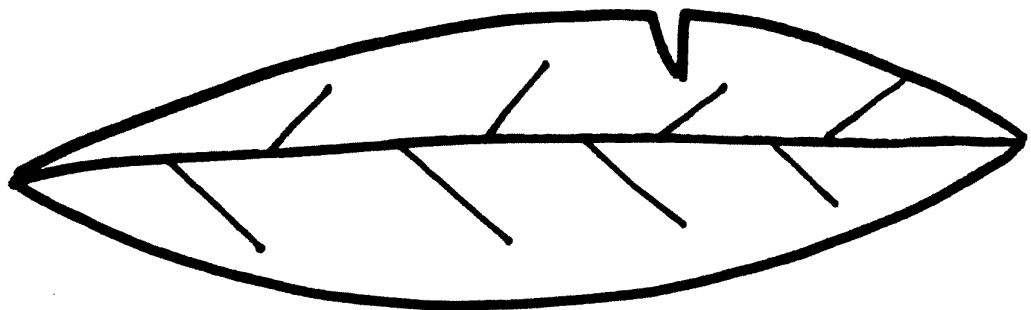

And all of them are brown.

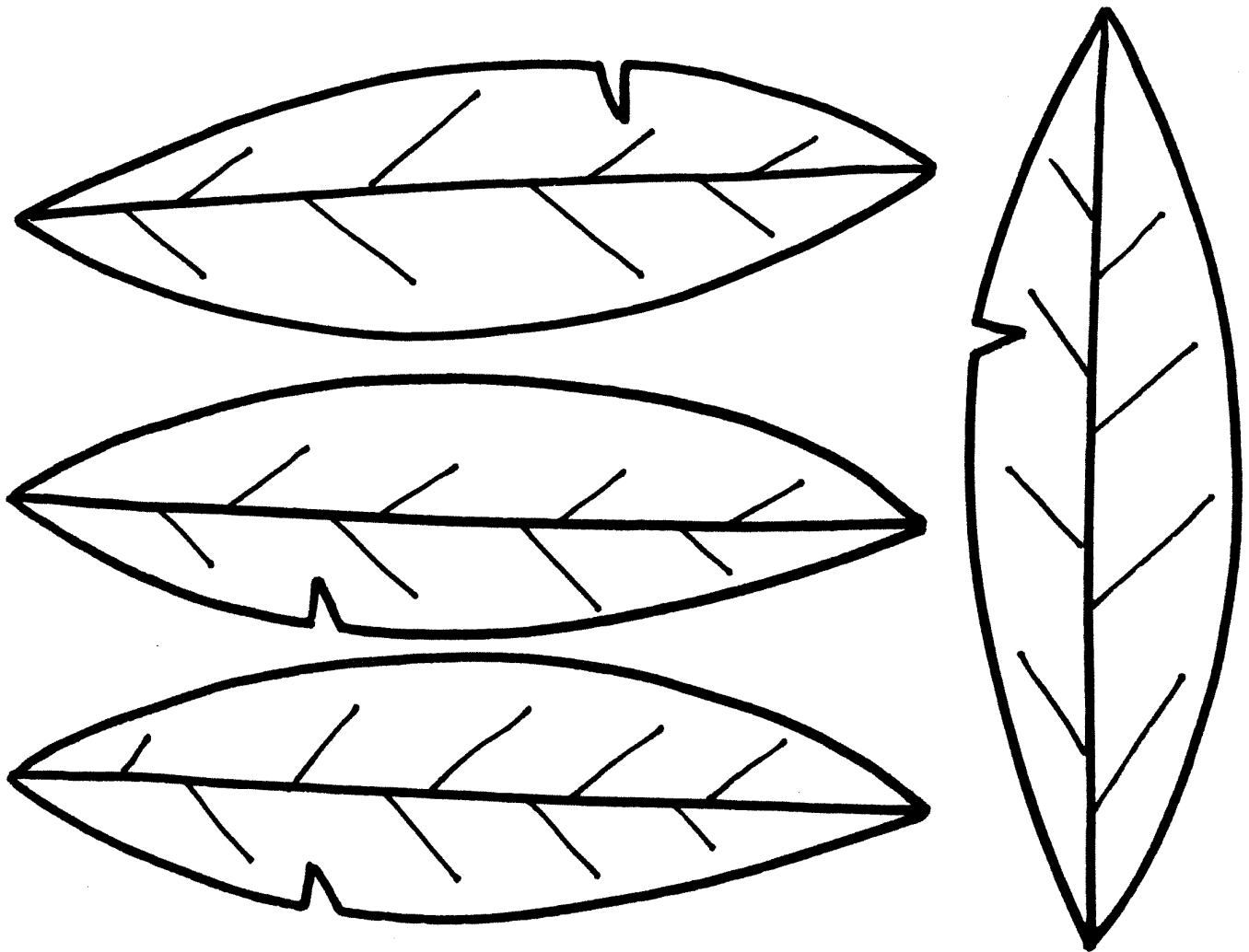
I am a very young turkey.

Class Play

Lesson # 4 - Thanksgiving Day - *Tom Turkey's Dilemma*

Suggested Teaching Strategies

Tips for Readings / Performances: Get students to underline their parts in the play; review and discuss difficult vocabulary; make sure each student has their own copy of the play. The script should be read through either silently or as a class before any performance is attempted.

Theme: "Thanksgiving Day: Tom Turkey's Dilemma" - *The good fortune of one may result in the misfortune of another or the importance of friendship.*

Background:

The origins of Canadian Thanksgiving are more closely connected to the traditions of Europe than the United States. Long before Europeans settled in North America, festivals of thanks and the celebrations of harvest took place in Europe in the month of October. The very first Thanksgiving celebration in North America took place in Canada when Martin Frobisher, an explorer from England, arrived in Newfoundland in 1578. He wanted to give thanks for his safe arrival to the New World. That means the first Thanksgiving in Canada was celebrated 43 years before the pilgrims landed in Plymouth, Massachusetts! On January 31, 1957, Canadian Parliament announced that the Canadian Thanksgiving would be celebrated each year on the second Monday in October.

NARRATOR: It is the day before Thanksgiving on the Appleby Farm. Some of the animals have gotten together in the barn for their daily evening chat before turning in for the night.



BOSSY COW: So, how was everyone's day? Not too stressful, I hope.

CLYDE HORSE: I had a very good day. Farmer Appleby took me out to the Back Forty to do some plowing. When we got there, he found a large poplar tree blown down, so he spent the entire afternoon cutting it up while I just stood around and munched grass.

HENNY HEN: I, too, had a splendid day. I laid an egg that was so round and perfect, that when the little Appleby girl saw it, she squealed with delight.

BOSSY COW: Isn't that wonderful. Well, I also had a good day. I was milked and fed, and then led out to pasture to graze for the entire afternoon.

CLYDE HORSE: What about you, Tom Turkey? How was your day?

TOM TURKEY: I had a marvelous day. The farmer's wife fussed over me for quite some time this morning. She even took me into the farmhouse and weighed me on the kitchen scales.

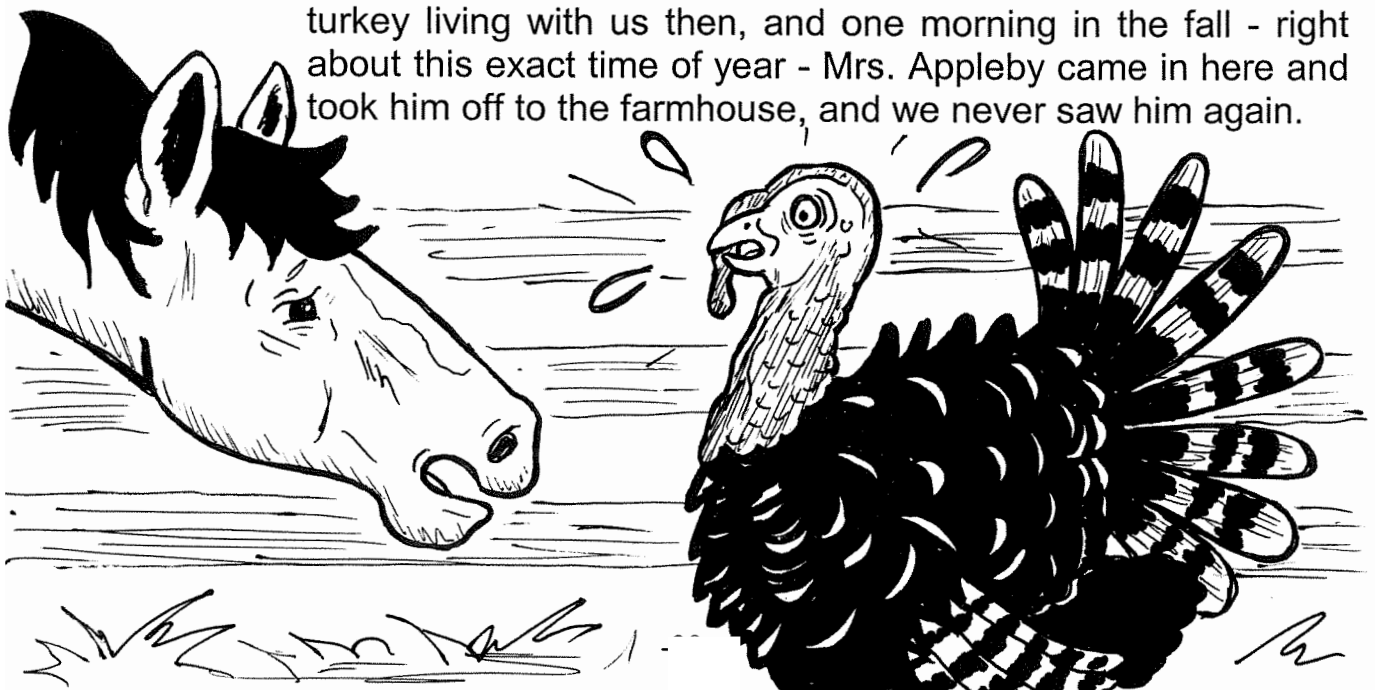
BOSSY COW: Isn't that wonderful. Those Applebys are such thoughtful people, they're always thinking of our health and welfare.

TOM TURKEY: They sure are. They've also been feeding me nothing but the very tastiest grain for the past couple of weeks.

CLYDE HORSE: They are very thoughtful, but perhaps they have a reason for being so kind to you, Tom.

TOM TURKEY: Really? What could that be?

CLYDE HORSE: Well, remember last year about this time? We had another turkey living with us then, and one morning in the fall - right about this exact time of year - Mrs. Appleby came in here and took him off to the farmhouse, and we never saw him again.



TOM TURKEY: (*Turning pale*) I'm sure it's just a coincidence.

HENNY HEN: I'm sure it is, Tom. I wouldn't worry, although I did hear the little Appleby girl mention something about a special holiday coming up soon - tomorrow, I believe.

TOM TURKEY: What could that mean?

BOSSY COW: A holiday is when people celebrate their good fortune by taking a day off work. Sometimes they even have a great feast.

TOM TURKEY: A great feast! You don't think they feast on turkeys, do you?

CLYDE HORSE: Well, I don't know if they do or they don't, Tom, but it is mighty peculiar that the last turkey vanished just before one of their feasts.

TOM TURKEY: Oh dear! What am I going to do? I can't let them eat me.

BOSSY COW: Of course not, Tom. Come on everyone, let's think of some way to save poor Tom.

HENNY HEN: Maybe we can hide him somewhere until the feasting has passed.

CLYDE HORSE: But where could we hide him? Farmer Appleby knows every nook and cranny of this farm - and it's not that big.

TOM TURKEY: Maybe I'll just have to run away then. I'll go somewhere where people don't eat poor, defenseless turkeys.

BOSSY COW: Now, now, Tom. Surely we can think of some way to see you safely through this ordeal.

HENNY HEN: I know what we can do. Why don't we disguise him for the next few days.

CLYDE HORSE: Disguise him! Disguise him as what, a human?

HENNY HEN: Of course not, silly. We could disguise him as a rooster, though. He kind of looks a bit like a rooster anyway. What do you think, Bossy?

BOSSY COW: It might just work. The Applebys aren't the brightest of people.

TOM TURKEY: Disguised as a rooster? What changes will we need to make?

HENNY HEN: We'll need a comb for the top of his head.



BOSSY COW: An old rubber glove should do the trick. What else?

HENNY HEN: Well, a rooster is much thinner, but if we put one of Mrs. Appleby's girdles on him and then cover it with a sweater, Tom should look about right.

CLYDE HORSE: And he'll have to practice shouting "cock-a-doodle-doo" at the top of his voice.

TOM TURKEY: I can do that. *Cock-a-doodle-doo!*

BOSSY COW: Splendid. Now - Henny - go get that girdle, sweater and rubber glove. When he's safely in his disguise, we'll stick him in the middle of all your chicken friends. Everything should be just fine.

HENNY HEN: I'll get right on it, Bossy. Aren't things working out just perfectly?

CLYDE HORSE: They certainly are. When friends put their heads together, there's no telling what they can accomplish.

BOSSY COW: That's so true! It just makes me realize how thankful we all should be for all of our friends and the blessings we enjoy.

CLYDE HORSE: What a fine idea, Bossy. We might even set a day aside each year to celebrate our thankfulness.

NARRATOR: And that was how the animals of the Appleby farm began their annual celebration of an event they called *Thanksgiving Day*. The only difference is - they don't eat turkey (or any other animal) on this special day.

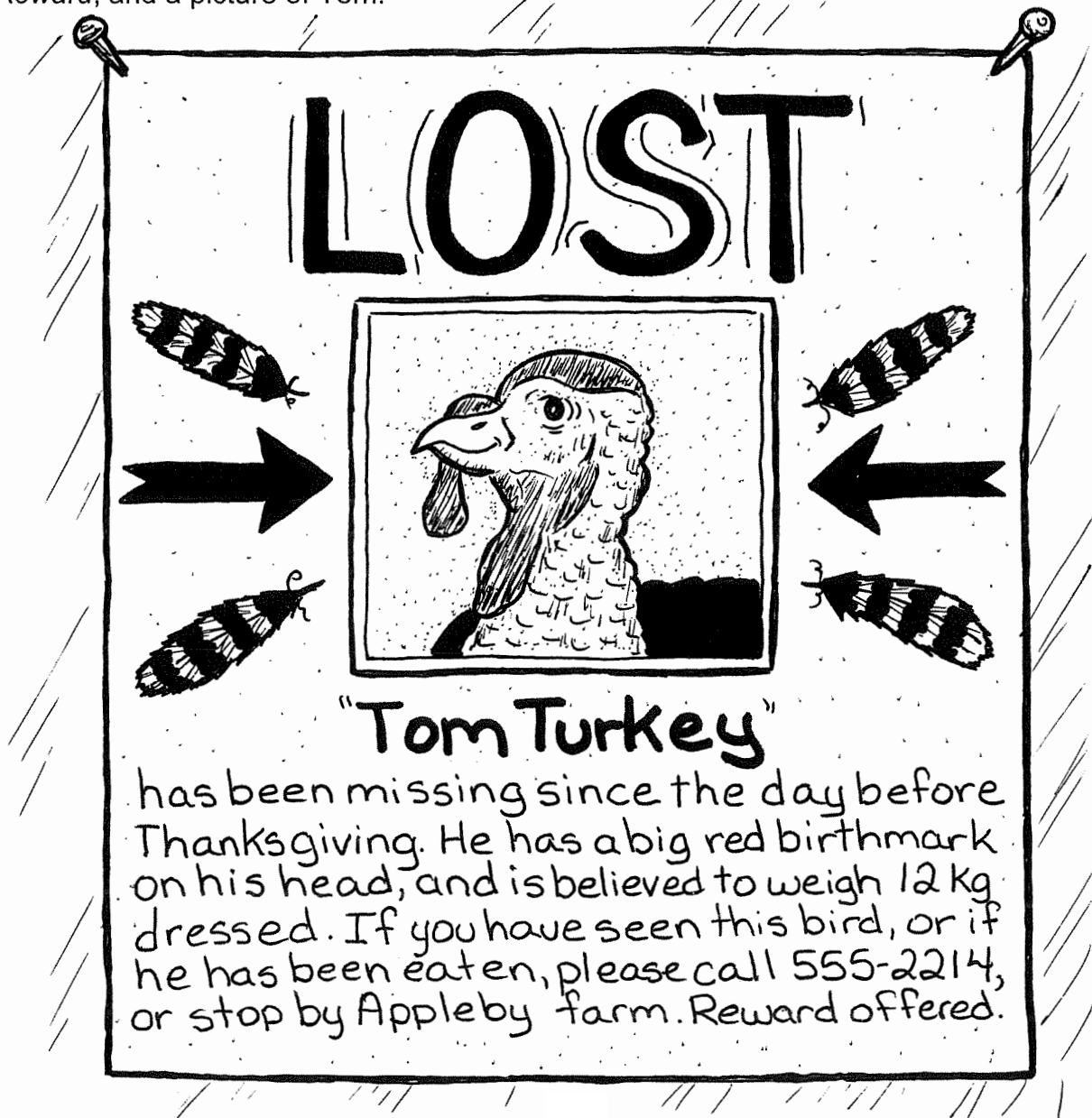
Creative Writing
