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# Class Play

## Lesson # 1 - Christmas - *The Story Of Rudolph*

### Suggested Teaching Strategies

Readers Theatre has been implemented in many classrooms as a fun and exciting way of reinforcing the teaching of reading, imparting information, and even teaching ideas or concepts. There are a multitude of ways that Readers Theatre can be implemented, ranging from *Circle Reading*, *Instant Reading*, *Co-operative Reading*, or *Staged Reading*. Performance approaches include *Chamber Theatre* and *Story Theatre*. Many of these approaches are outlined in future lessons.

Listed below are a number of suggestions to get started:

- scripts should be read rather than recited
- actors are encouraged to stay in the same spot, instead of moving around the stage
- movements, actions, gestures and expressive voices are encouraged
- simple costumes and props can be used. Even an interesting hat can be an effective addition.

**Theme:** “Christmas: The Story of Rudolph” - *Seeming “disabilities” can be turned to advantage through perseverance.*

### **Background:**

Rudolph came to life in 1939, when the Chicago-based Montgomery Ward department stores asked one of their copywriters, 34-year-old Robert L. May, to come up with a Christmas story they could give away to shoppers as a promotional gimmick.

May, drawing in part on the tale of *The Ugly Duckling* and his own background (he was often taunted as a child for being shy, small, and slight), settled on the idea of an underdog ostracized by the reindeer community because of his physical abnormality: a glowing red nose. Looking for an alliterative name, May considered and rejected *Rollo* and *Reginald* before deciding on *Rudolph*. He then proceeded to write Rudolph's story in verse, as a series of rhyming couplets, testing it out on his 4-year-old daughter, Barbara.

May's boss was worried that a story featuring a red nose - an image associated with drinking and drunkards - was unsuitable for a Christmas tale. Denver Gillen's illustrations of a red-nosed reindeer, however, soon overcame the hesitancy of May's bosses and the Rudolph story was approved.

Montgomery Ward distributed 2.4 million copies of the Rudolph booklet in 1939, and although wartime paper shortages curtailed printing for the next several years, a total of 6 million copies had been given out by the end of 1946.

**NARRATOR:** It was Christmas Eve, about an hour before Santa would begin his annual journey, and all his reindeer were gathered together to prepare for the trip.

**BLITZEN:** What are you doing, Comet? You should be getting ready for our flight. Tonight's Christmas Eve.

**COMET:** Are you kidding? I've been toning my muscles for weeks in preparation for the big flight!

**PRANCER:** Toning your muscles? Whoever heard of a reindeer doing such a thing.

**CUPID:** That's nothing! You know Rudolph - that weirdo, red-nosed duffus? I heard he's practicing for the trip by doing pushups.

**PRANCER:** Push-ups! How on earth can a reindeer do pushups? Besides, Santa won't ever pick Rudolph for the trip! Who'd want someone who looked like that pulling Santa's sleigh?



**CUPID:** He sure wants to go on the Christmas Eve trip, doesn't he? I've never seen anyone want to go as badly as Rudolph.

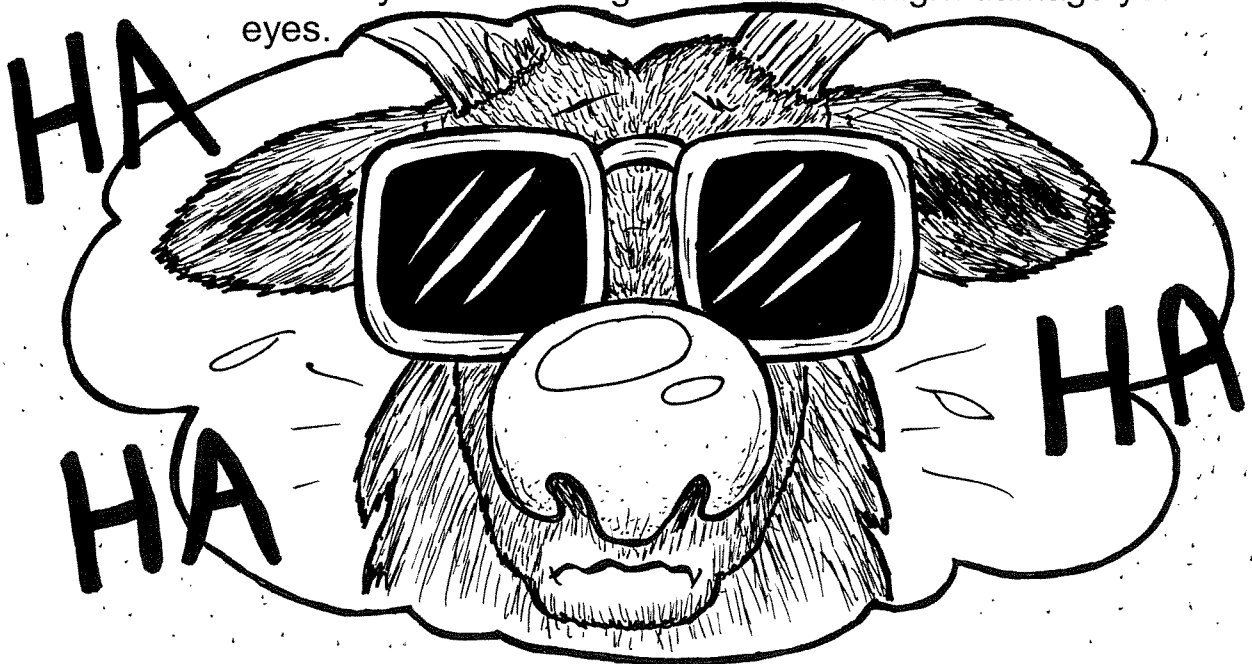
**BLITZEN:** Yah, but Santa only needs eight reindeer to pull his sleigh and if Rudolph went - that would make nine.

**PRANCER:** Besides, his bright red nose would be an embarrassment. Have you ever seen anything like it? When he gets excited, it lights up the whole countryside.

**COMET:** Shhh! Here he comes now.

**ALL REINDEER:** Hiya, Red Nose!

**CUPID:** Would you like to borrow my sun glasses, Rudolph? That nose of yours is so bright I'm afraid it might damage your eyes.



**RUDOLPH:** Have you seen how bad it's snowing out there? You can't see for more than a few feet in front of you.

**NARRATOR:** The reindeer rush over to the window.

**COMET:** Wow! Old Red Nose was right. Look at all that snow!

**CUPID:** It's a regular blizzard!

**COMET:** I hope this doesn't mean Santa will have to cancel his Christmas trip.

**BLITZEN:** Don't be silly. Santa would never cancel his trip. That would be the same as cancelling Christmas!

**PRANCER:** Think of all the heart-broken boys and girls on Christmas morning.

**RUDOLPH:** But how will he be able to find his way through this blizzard? It's really, really blowing up a storm out there!

**CUPID:** Santa will think of a way. Don't worry, Red Nose.

**COMET:** And don't think it'll change Santa's mind about taking along an extra reindeer. That nose of yours is a joke. It would scare all the kids half to death!

**BLITZEN:** Okay, gang, let's get ready. Santa will be coming over here to the reindeer house soon to hook us up to his sleigh. We've got a long night ahead of us, especially with this blizzard.

**PRANCER:** Well, look who's coming.

**CUPID:** It's Alphie, Santa's chief elf.

**BLITZEN:** What are you doing over here in the reindeer house, Alphie?

**ALPHIE:** Santa sent me to talk to you. The snowstorm has really caused a problem for our trip tonight.

**COMET:** What do you mean, Alphie? Is Santa thinking of cancelling the trip?

**ALPHIE:** He sure is! Santa is afraid he won't be able to find his way around in this blizzard.

**PRANCER:** What if we attached a big spotlight to his sleigh? That would light things up.



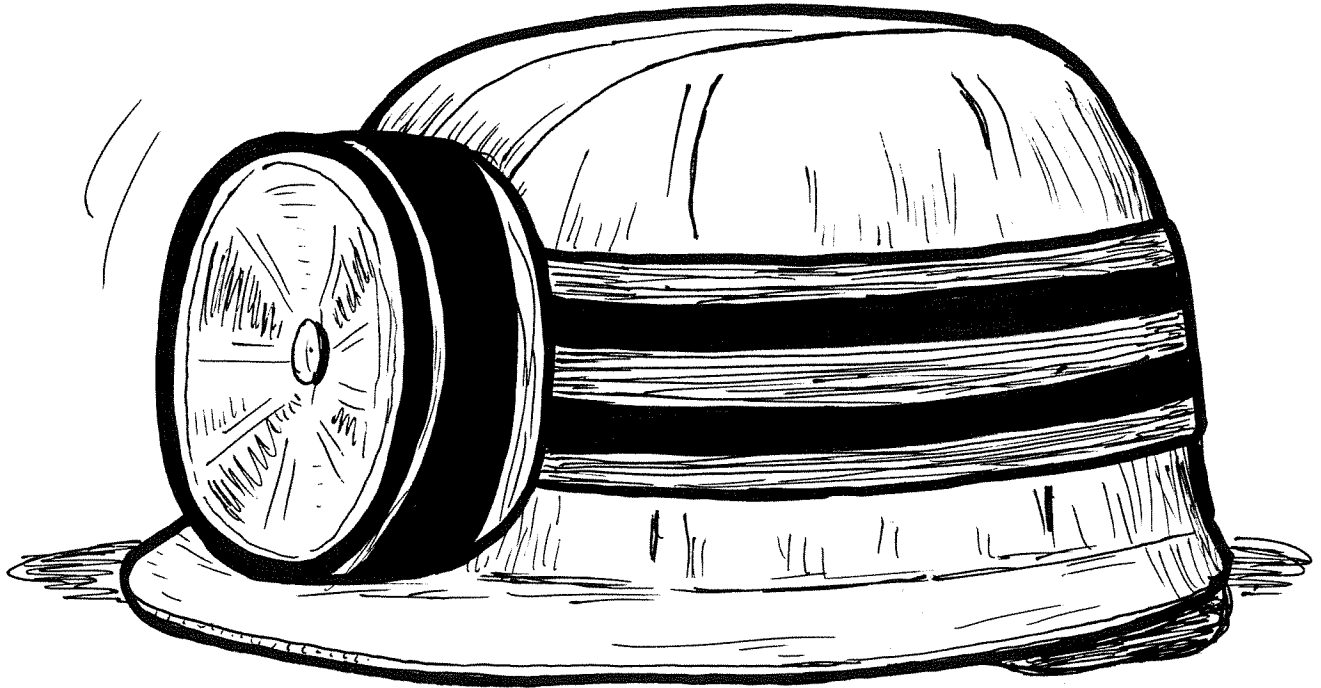
**CUPID:** Don't be silly, Prancer. How would Santa power such a big light?

**BLITZEN:** That's right. What could he use - a ten thousand mile long extension cord?

**PRANCER:** Yah - or maybe he could power it with a thousand little batteries!

**COMET:** Maybe if all the reindeer had smaller lights - like what miners have on their helmets - that would light the way.

**RUDOLPH:** I don't think they'd be bright enough in a storm, would they?



**CUPID:** I can tell you one thing that *would* be bright enough - that great, big, red honker of yours, Rudolph! That nose of yours would light up everything for miles around - even in a snowstorm.

**ALPHIE:** Wait a minute. That's it! We can put Rudolph at the head of the reindeer team - his bright red nose would light the way for Santa.

**CUPID:** Hey! I was only joking.

**ALPHIE:** I know you were joking. You reindeer are always teasing Rudolph and trying to make his life miserable. But this is one time when your teasing has backfired on you. I'm going back to Santa's Workshop and tell him the good news. In the meantime, all of you get ready - and make sure Rudolph is the lead reindeer for tonight's flight.

**NARRATOR:** After Alphie leaves, the reindeer are quiet for a moment, then Blitzen approaches Rudolph.

**BLITZEN:** Well, I guess you are going to have the last laugh on us, Rudolph. Alphie's right. We've done nothing but tease you about that red nose of yours, but now you're about to save Christmas for all the boys and girls around the world.

**ALL REINDEER:** Hurray for Rudolph! Hurray for Rudolph and his big red honker!

**NARRATOR:** So Rudolph, with his large red nose, guided Santa's sleigh safely through the snowstorm on Christmas Eve. Thanks to his extraordinary nose, he saved all the children of the world from being disappointed on Christmas morning!

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2. Describe the crisis that emerged for Santa and the reindeer.

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4. We learn quite a bit about the characters of Santa's other reindeer in this story. How would you describe their characters from the way they react to Rudolph and his red nose?

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5. Like many fairy tales, the story of Rudolph defies **logic** on many fronts. Give two examples of this.

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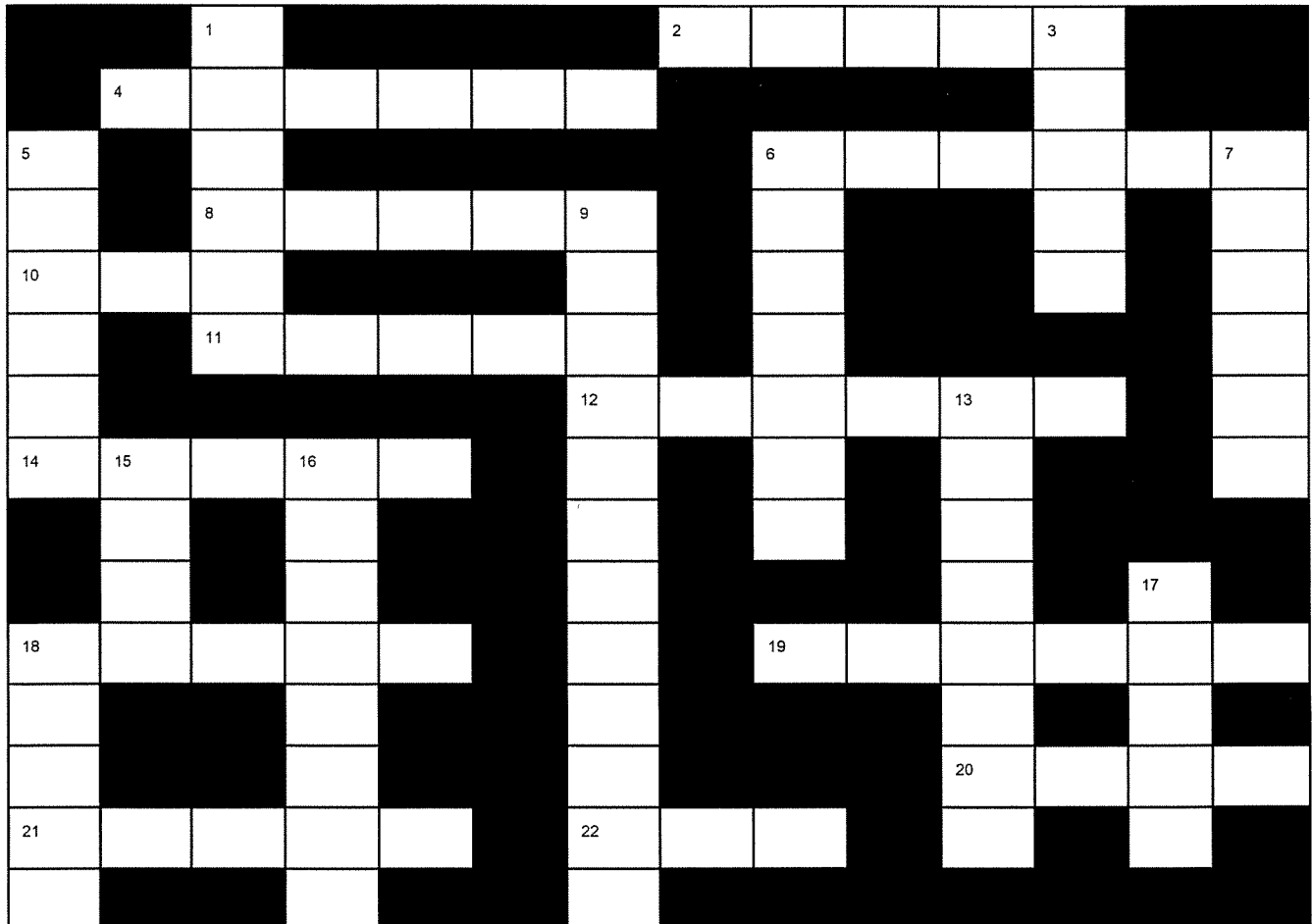

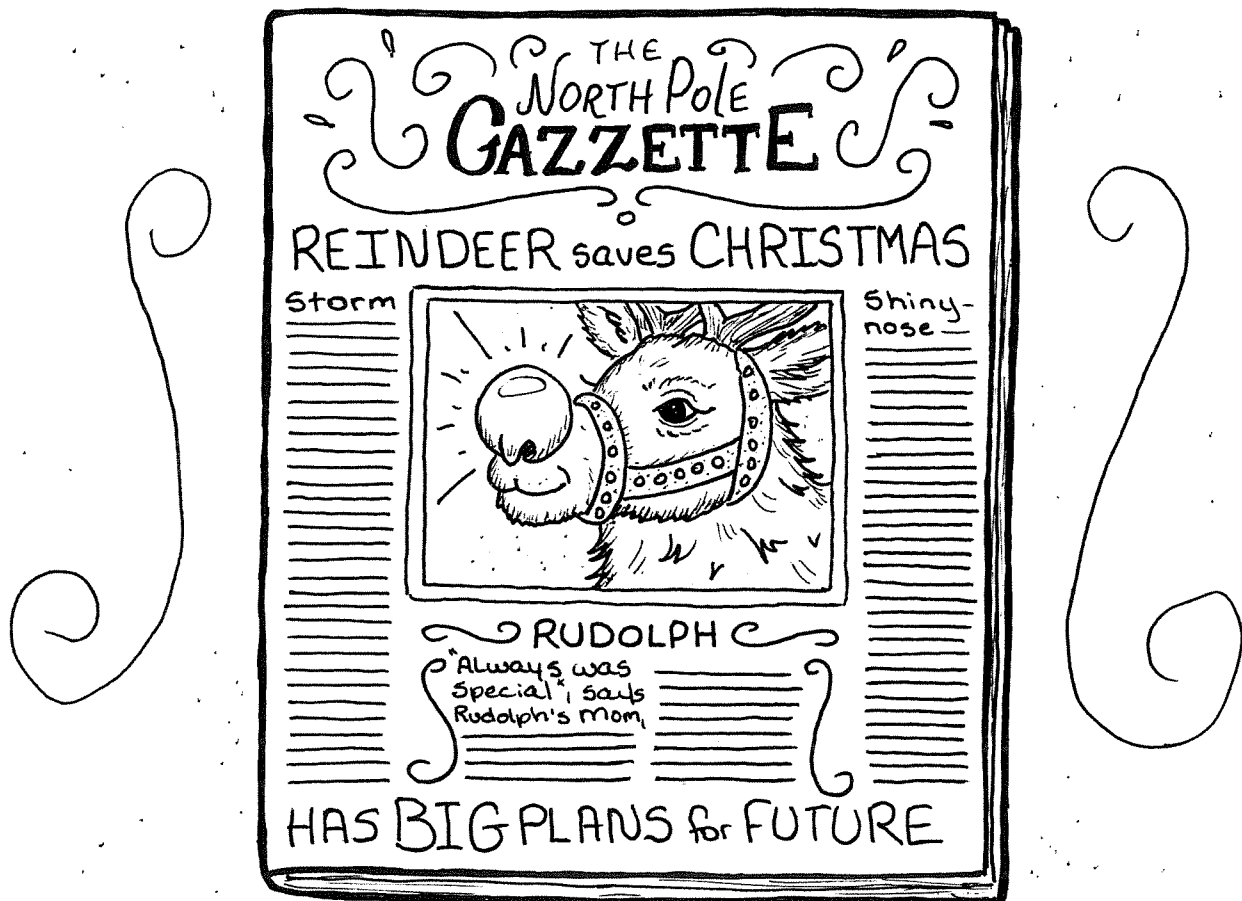
## Investigation

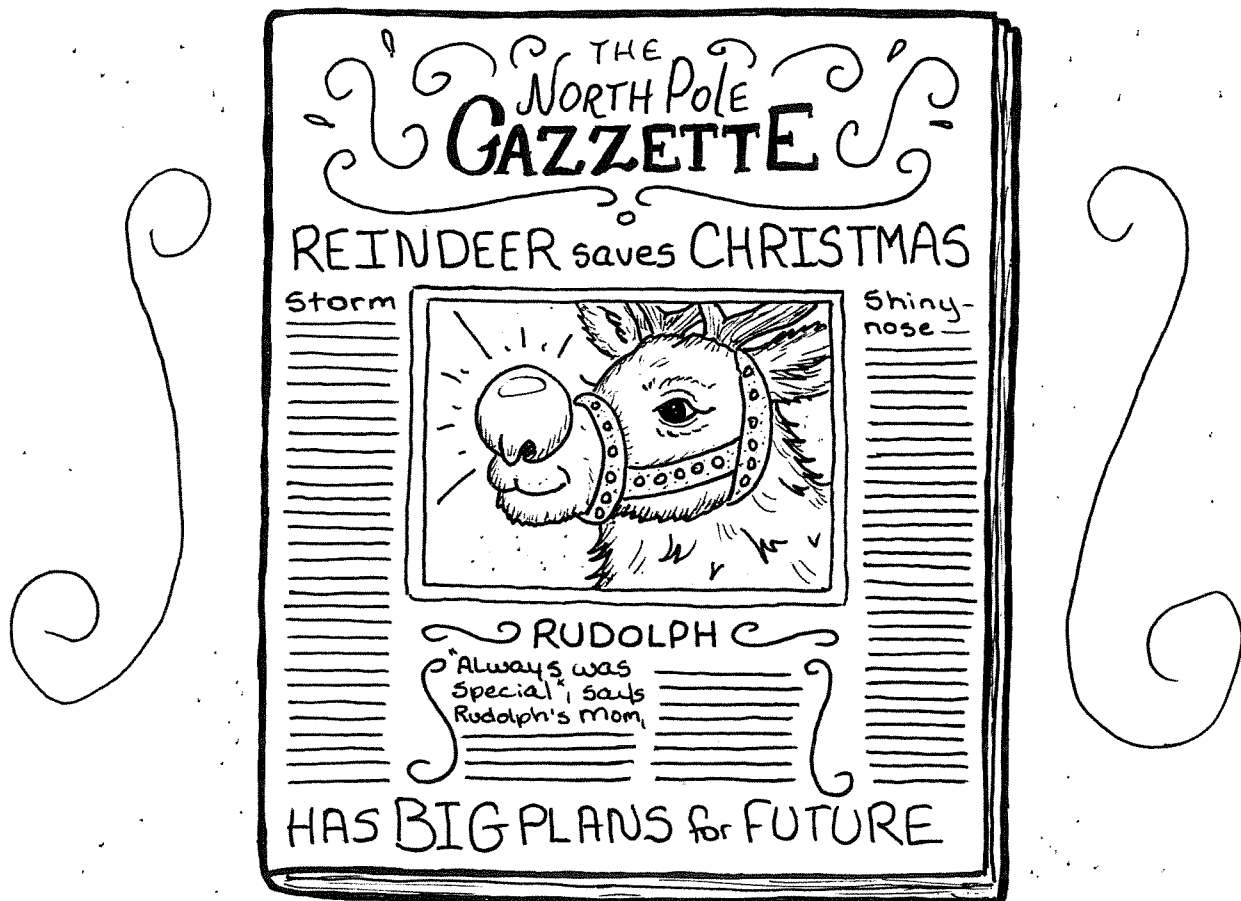
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# Lesson # 2 - Christmas - Benjamin, The Shepherd Boy

## Suggested Teaching Strategies

When reading or performing, students should always face the audience. To provide variety, one or more students might be seated instead of having them all stand in a line. Simple props such as masks can be used to good effect. As well, percussion instruments, sound effects and mime gestures can add to the overall results of a performance.

**Theme:** "Christmas: Benjamin, the Shepherd Boy" - *Selfless sacrifice is usually rewarded.*

### **Background:**

Christmas is the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, 2000 years ago. Recognized by Christians as the Son of God, the life and teachings of Jesus are found in the first four books of the New Testament in the Bible.

**NARRATOR:** Benjamin's father owns a large flock of sheep. One Friday afternoon, when Benjamin returns home from school, his mother meets him at the door.

**BENJAMIN:** Mother, my friend, Caleb, has invited some boys over to his house to spend the night. It's his birthday. Can I go?

**MOTHER:** I'm afraid not, Benjamin. Your father came home from the fields today quite ill. He has asked me to tell you that he needs you to help the shepherds tend the flocks tonight.

**BENJAMIN:** But that's not fair. It's the first time I've ever been invited to Caleb's home. He may never ask me again.

**MOTHER:** I'm sorry, Benjamin, but your father needs you to help the other shepherds until midnight. Perhaps you can go over to Caleb's house some other time.

**BENJAMIN:** I hate being the son of a shepherd! Why couldn't my father be a carpenter or a merchant - or even a tax collector? All I ever do is work out in the fields looking after those stupid sheep.

**MOTHER:** I'm sorry you feel that way, son. Here comes Father's chief shepherd, Reuben. He will take you out to the flock.

**NARRATOR:** So, Benjamin's mother packs him several pieces of bread and fish, and he goes with Reuben out to the flock of sheep to help the shepherds watch over them.

**REUBEN:** I'm very glad that you are able to come and help Jacob and I tonight, Benjamin.

**JACOB:** That's right. Many lambs have been born lately and it is very important to have another set of eyes to look out for them.

**BENJAMIN:** That's alright, I guess, although my friend, Caleb, was having some friends sleep over at his place and I was invited.

**REUBEN:** How good of you to sacrifice your happiness. God will surely reward you.

**BENJAMIN:** I doubt if God notices a young boy like me or cares about his problems.

**JACOB:** God notices everyone and everything. He knows the name of even the smallest lamb in our flock.

**BENJAMIN:** We shall see.

**REUBEN:** Indeed we shall. Look at how beautiful the night sky is, Benjamin. Look at the stars up in the heavens - you can't possibly count them, yet God knows how many there are.

**JACOB:** And he knows your heart, Benjamin. He knows what you are thinking and what it is you dream of. Think of that!

**NARRATOR:** Suddenly, a bright light appears in the night sky, lighting everything around Benjamin and the other shepherds.

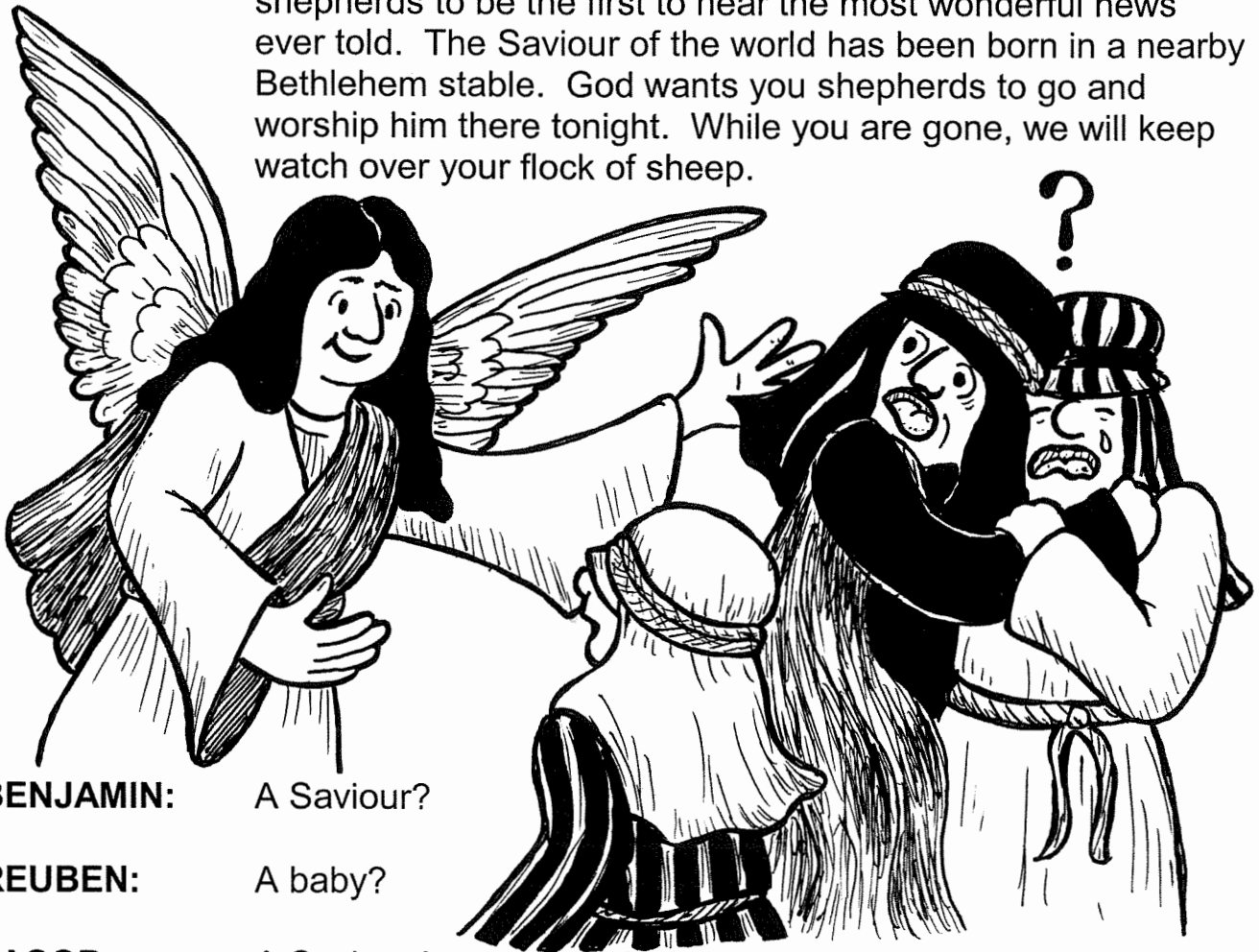
**BENJAMIN:** (*Shouting*) What is it?

**ALL SHEPHERDS:** It is the end of the world!

**ANGEL:** Don't be afraid. I am an angel of the Lord. I have come to bring you wonderful news.

**BENJAMIN:** An angel from God?

**ANGEL:** That's right, Benjamin. God has chosen you and your fellow shepherds to be the first to hear the most wonderful news ever told. The Saviour of the world has been born in a nearby Bethlehem stable. God wants you shepherds to go and worship him there tonight. While you are gone, we will keep watch over your flock of sheep.



**BENJAMIN:** A Saviour?

**REUBEN:** A baby?

**JACOB:** A Saviour born in a stable? In the little town of Bethlehem?

**REUBEN:** God is great!

**JACOB:** What will we bring the Saviour? We have no gifts to bring.

**ANGEL:** God wants you to simply go and worship. Your obedience and love will be gift enough.

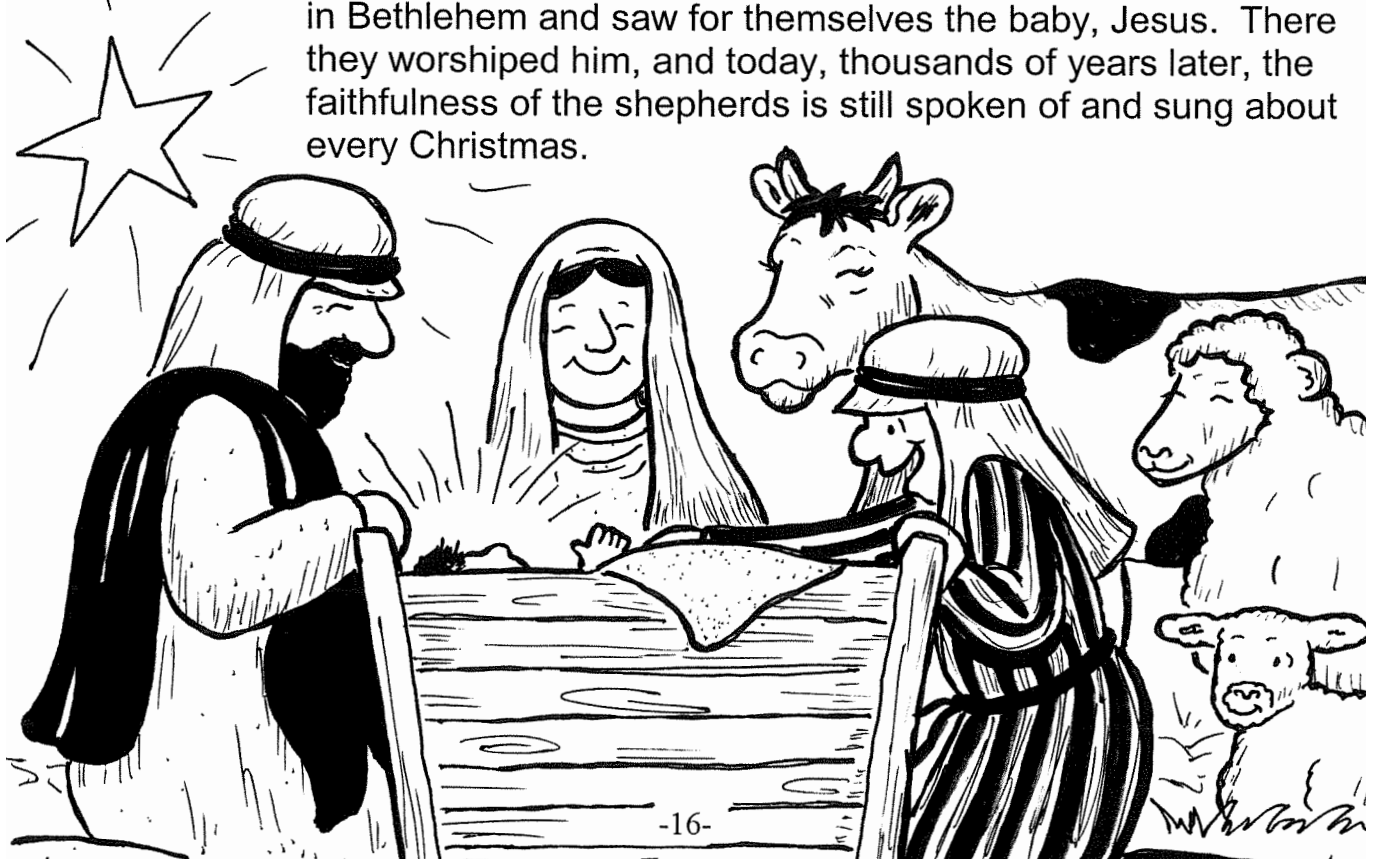
**BENJAMIN:** But why us? Why did God choose poor shepherds to hear this wonderful news? Why did he choose us to go and worship the Saviour?

**ANGEL:** God loves those who are faithful to Him.

**BENJAMIN:** But I complained when my mother said I had to look after the sheep. I didn't want to come and I gave her a difficult time.

**ANGEL:** God wants you to know your own heart better, Benjamin. Now go to Bethlehem with Reuben and Jacob and see the baby, Jesus, with your own eyes - the one who will be the Saviour of the world.

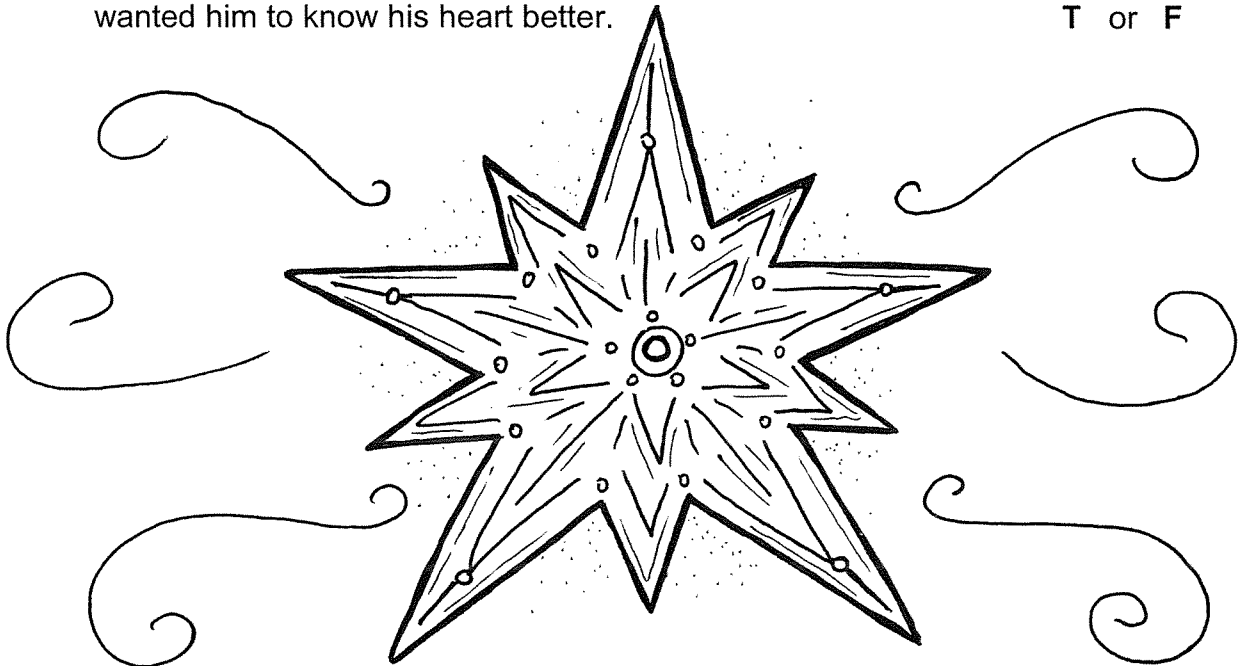

## Investigation / Art

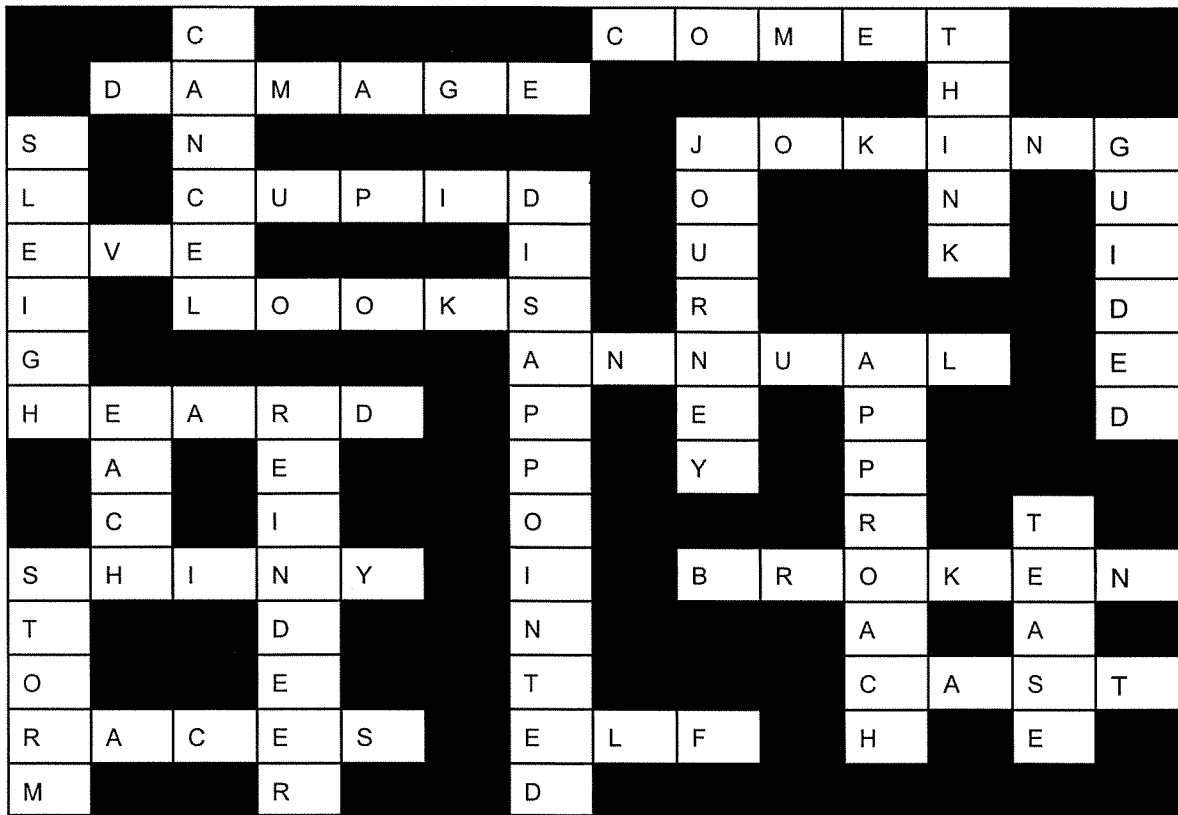
