Class Play

Lesson # 3 - St. Patrick's Day - *The Leprechaun's Gold*

Suggested Teaching Strategies

Rehearsals: Have the students read the play more than once before any type of performance is attempted. This can be done orally as a class, or in small groups, pairs or individually. Difficult words or phrases can be mastered through repetition. Rehearsal of a play is a very interesting way of learning new words and concepts.

Theme: "St. Patrick's Day: The Leprechaun's Gold" - *A bird in the hand is worth two in the bush.*

Background:

St. Patrick was the patron saint and national apostle of Ireland who is credited with bringing Christianity to the *Emerald Isle* in the fourth century. Saint Patrick is best known for **driving the snakes from Ireland**. It is true there are no snakes in Ireland, but there probably never have been -- the island was separated from the rest of the continent at the end of the Ice Age. There are several accounts of St. Patrick's death. One says that St. Patrick died at Saul, Downpatrick, Ireland, on March 17, 460 A.D. Saint Patrick's Day has come to be associated with everything Irish: anything green and gold, shamrocks and luck. Most importantly, to those who celebrate its intended meaning, St. Patrick's Day is a traditional day for spiritual renewal.

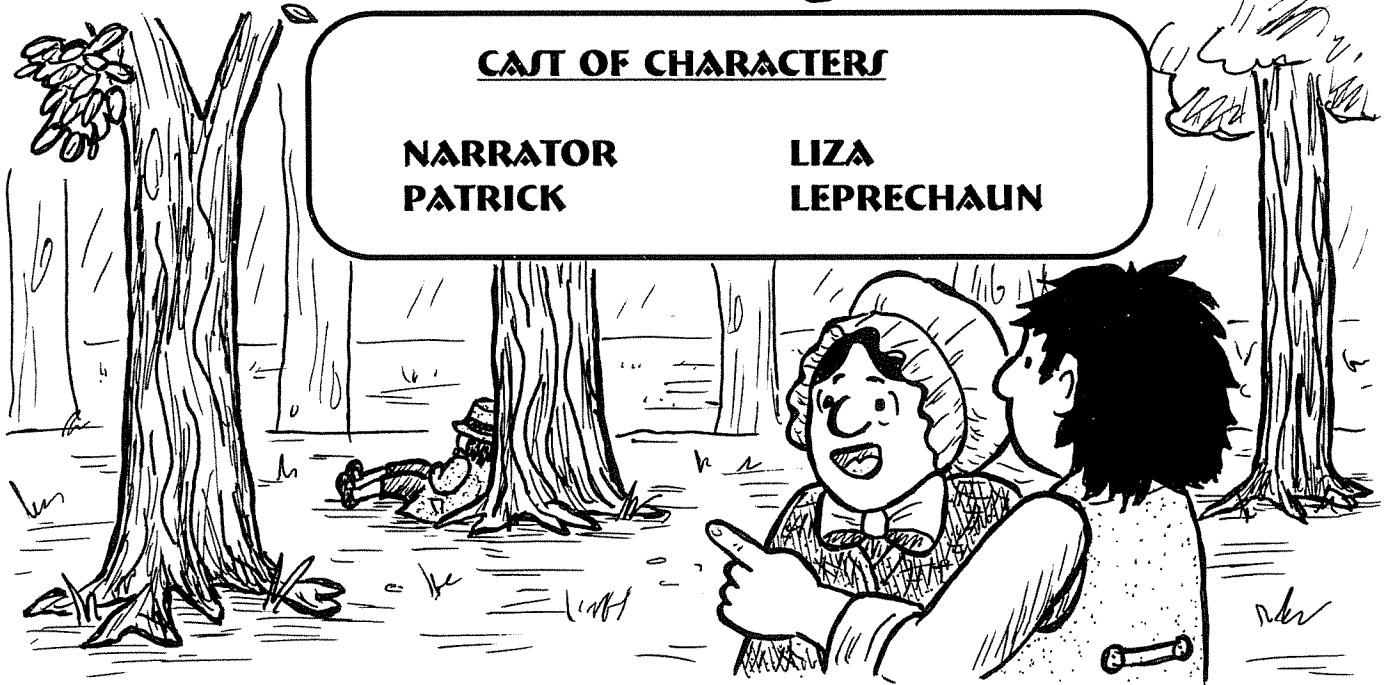
The Leprechaun's Gold

NARRATOR: Patrick and his sister, Liza, were two children who lived in Ireland many years ago. One day, when they were out for a walk in the forest, they came upon a wee leprechaun.

PATRICK: By the dickens, Liza, would you look over by the big oak tree - it's one of the little people, a leprechaun.

LIZA: Hush, Patrick. I've heard it said that if you catch one of the little people and you don't take your eyes off him - even for a minute - they have to take you to their treasure.

PATRICK: Let's give it a try, Liza. Think of what a pot of gold will mean to Mom and Pa and to our little potato farm.

LIZA: *(Shouting)* You there, little fella. Stop where you are!

PATRICK: That's right. We've found you, now you must lead us to your treasure.

LIZA: And no tricks either. I've hear you little people are as slippery as a greased monkey.

LEPRECHAUN: Ah, my poor misinformed children. We little folk have no treasure. I am but a poor cobbler.

PATRICK: A cobbler? Then why are your shoes in such a sad state of repair?

LIZA: You're lying! You're a leprechaun and you must take us to your treasure. It's the way of things here on the green isle.

LEPRECHAUN: I can see that you are indeed clever children, but please have mercy on me. We little people are very hard workers. We work our fingers to the bone for every penny we earn.

PATRICK: Don't try to trick us, leprechaun, or make us feel sorry for you. You must lead us to your pot of gold.

LEPRECHAUN: So a pot of gold, is it? Who told you I had a pot of gold? Do you know how hard it is to save even one single gold coin?

LIZA: It is said that the little people have pots of gold that they hide from the rest of us. Everyone knows that the pots of gold can be found at the end of the rainbow.



LEPRECHAUN: What utter nonsense! Hee, hee. Who ever heard of such a thing? Have you ever seen the end of a rainbow? Such a thing does not exist.

PATRICK: Don't take your eyes off him, Liza. As long as one of us is watching him, he can't disappear and he has to do whatever we tell him to. It's the law.

LEPRECHAUN: What law? I thought you were a clever lad. Whoever heard of a government passing such a law. . . Ah - LOOK OUT!
(Screams) A SNAKE! Look out children, there's a big black snake about to crawl up your pant leg! Get out of the way!

PATRICK: (*Dancing out of the way*) Where? Where?

LIZA: Don't be daft, Patrick. It's a trick. There are no snakes in Ireland. The good saint drove them out ages ago. I'll not be taking my eyes off this little man for such a silly thing.

LEPRECHAUN: Ah, lassie. Such a cynical spirit in one so young.

LIZA: Just take us to your pot of gold, and no more tricks.

LEPRECHAUN: Very well. Come right this way and I will certainly be happy to oblige you. But be sure to keep your eyes on me at all times and I will lead you to my treasure.

NARRATOR: So, the little man led the two children deeper and deeper into the woods, farther than they had ever been before. Finally, he brought them to a great old stump on the edge of a clearing.

LEPRECHAUN: There's my treasure, children. Over by yonder stump. Can you not see the black pot nestled in the hollow of the old stump?

PATRICK: So it is, Liza. Let's go get it. We've done it, we have found the treasure.

LIZA: Be careful, Patrick. It could be a trick. You go and take a look while I keep my eye on this little scalawag.

LEPRECHAUN: Ah, children, what's the matter? Don't you trust an honest face? Shame on you. The both of you can go over and take possession of the pot of gold. It's yours!

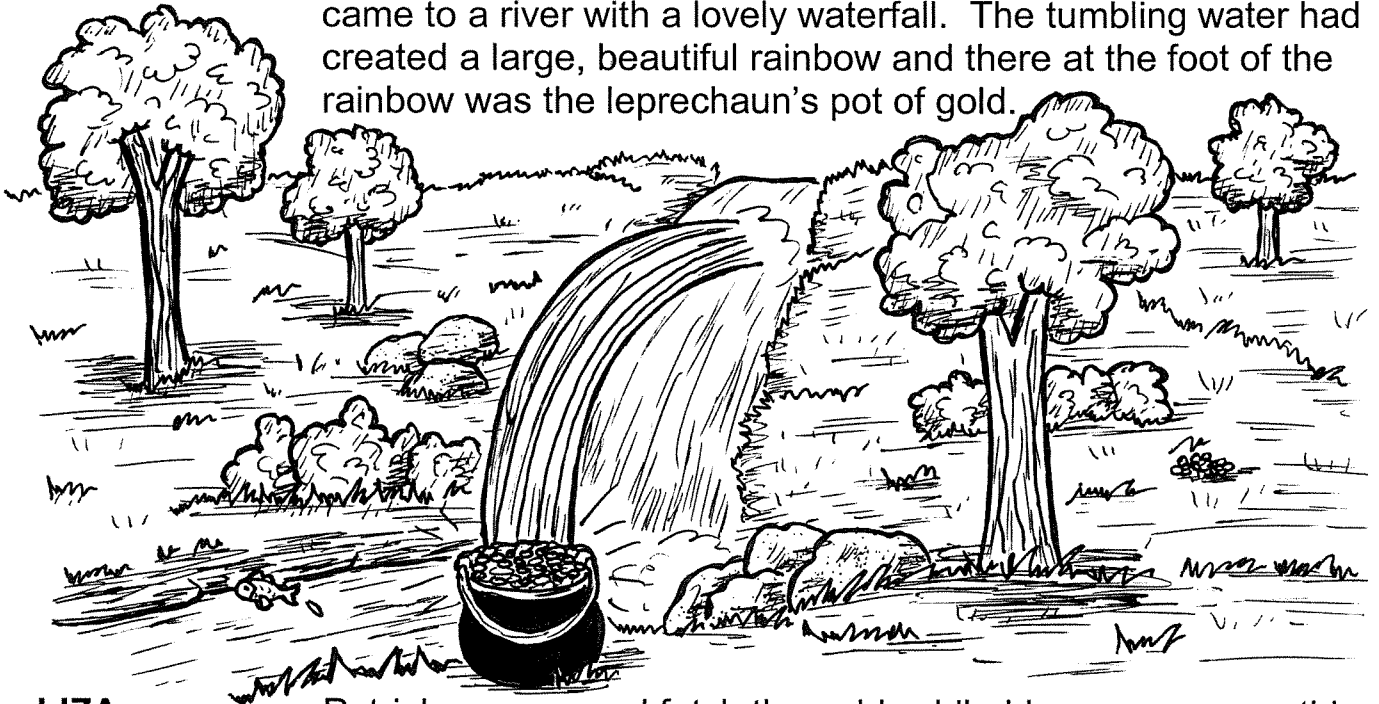
LIZA: Patrick will go take a look. I'll stay here and keep my eyes glued to you.

NARRATOR: So, Patrick went over to the stump and quickly reported back to Liza, with downcast face.

PATRICK: It wasn't a pot of gold, Liza. It was only an old black boot. The little man tried to trick us.

LIZA: No more games, leprechaun. We won't be taking our eyes off you. Now lead us to your treasure!

NARRATOR: So, onward through the forest they were led, until finally they came to a river with a lovely waterfall. The tumbling water had created a large, beautiful rainbow and there at the foot of the rainbow was the leprechaun's pot of gold.



LIZA: Patrick, you go and fetch the gold, while I keep my eye on this tricky little imp.

PATRICK: We're rich, Liza! Look at all of the lovely gold coins in this pot. No more picking potatoes out of the field on those cold, cold mornings. Now Mom and Pa will never have to work again.

LEPRECHAUN: It warms my heart to see how my hard-earned savings have made you children so happy. Now, I suppose you'll be wanting to steal the pot at the other end of the rainbow too?

PATRICK: There's a pot at the other end of the rainbow?

LEPRECHAUN: Of course. It's just beyond the little hill over yonder. You can see for yourself where the rainbow ends.

LIZA: Patrick, you stay here with this crafty devil and don't take your eyes off him. I'll go over there and collect the other pot of gold.

NARRATOR: So, Liza struck off for the other end of the rainbow while Patrick kept watch over the leprechaun and the pot of gold.

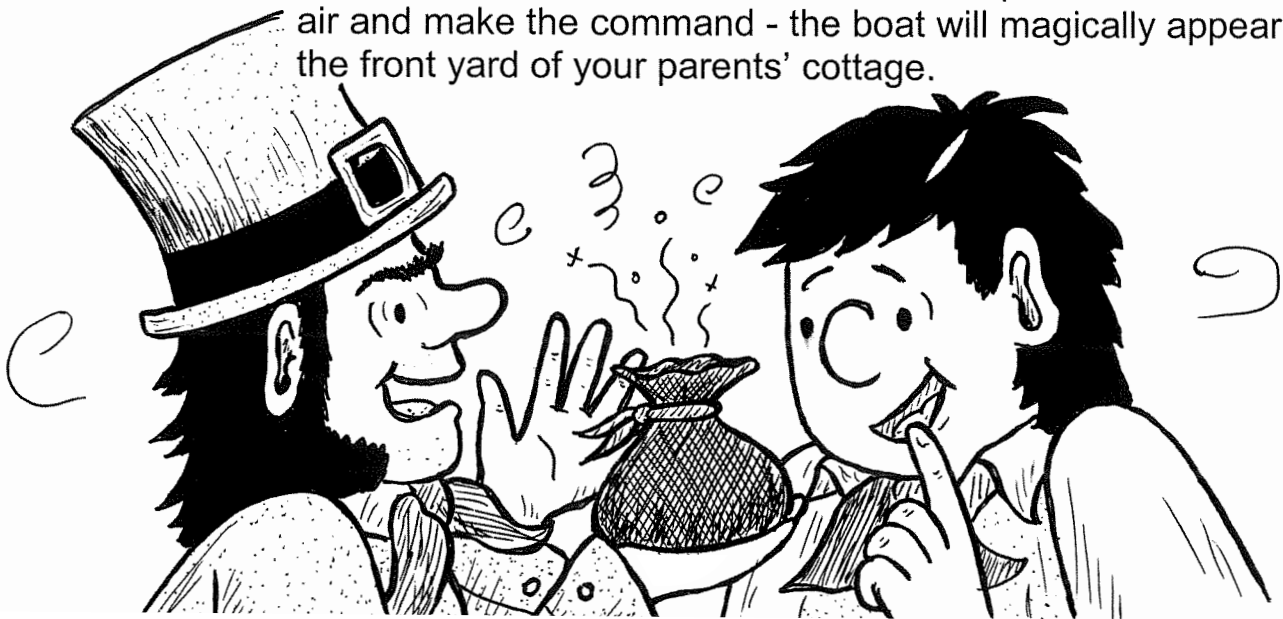
LEPRECHAUN: You are one lucky boy. What will you and your sister do with such wealth?

PATRICK: I am going to buy myself a boat so I can go fishing out on the bay.

LEPRECHAUN: A boat? Why I have a boat right here on this little river. Do you see it over yonder, tied to the tree by the big rock? I use it to catch the biggest, tastiest fish in all of Ireland. If you like it, I might be persuaded to sell it to you for a very good price.

PATRICK: That is a very sturdy-looking boat, to be sure, but how would I get it back home?

LEPRECHAUN: By magic, of course. I can use some of this magic powder here in my little pouch. When I throw this pixie dust into the air and make the command - the boat will magically appear in the front yard of your parents' cottage.



PATRICK: That would be the cat's pajamas. How much would you be asking for it?

LEPRECHAUN: Three gold coins from my treasure pot. That's all I would ask.

PATRICK: That seems like a fair bargain. If I give you the coins, though, there's no backing out - no matter what.

LEPRECHAUN: If you give me the three gold coins, the boat is yours. You have my word of honour.

NARRATOR: As Patrick reaches into the pot for the three gold coins, he takes his eyes off the leprechaun - only for an instant, but it is long enough for the little man to disappear in a puff of pixie dust - and with him, he takes the pot of gold! At that moment Liza returns - empty handed from her trip to the other end of the rainbow.

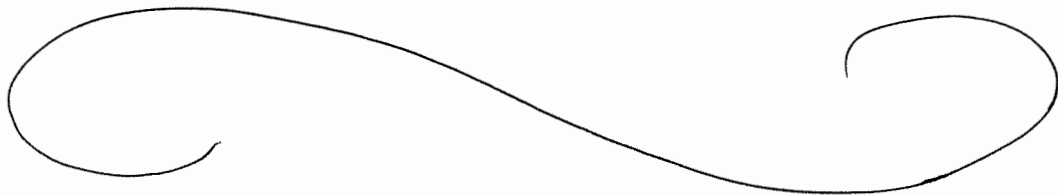
PATRICK: Liza, where is the other pot of gold?

LIZA: There was no other pot. It was a trick. Now, tell me, brother, where is the pot of gold I left you with?

PATRICK: Ah, the little man tricked me out of it, but I did buy that boat from him. He gave me his word that I could keep it, and so I shall.

LIZA: You foolish brother. I should never have left you in charge of the treasure. We were both too greedy. We should have been content with the one pot we had. Now all we have is a leaky old boat in the middle of a forest miles from home.

NARRATOR: And so, Liza and Patrick returned to their parents' cottage empty-handed, but wiser to the ways of the little people.

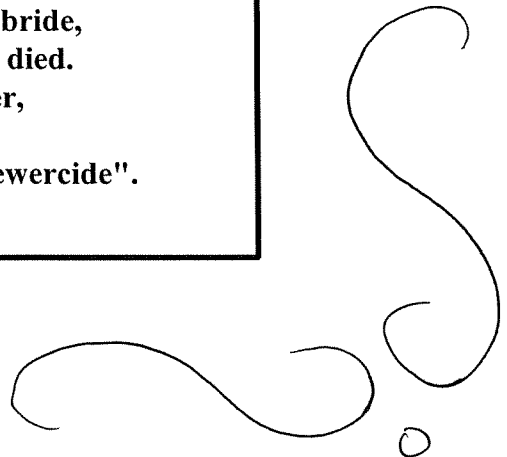


Creative Writing
